COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



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INTRODUCTION


Community opinion is a core consideration in Council's decision making process. We have undertaken several community engagement activities to ensure the community is aware of the proposals and that they are provided with the necessary information to make an informed decision on Council's options in relation to the Fit for the Future Reform Program.

This comprehensive dialogue has confirmed that our community remains adamantly opposed to any proposal to merge our Council. The people of the City of Botany Bay have spoken, they want a Council that is local, efficient and financially responsible. In short, our residents and ratepayers have come to the same conclusion as Council itself: the City of Botany Bay is Fit for the Future.

WHAT OUR RESIDENTS SAY

The City of Botany Bay is committed to maintaining an open dialogue with its residents on all issues including merger options.

Since 2013, Council has conducted three surveys of local residents concerning the issue of amalgamation; the *Independent Local Government Review Panel Report* and the *Fit for the Future* process.



June 2013

Council conducted a voluntary survey of 17,000 households asking for their views on whether:

- · The City of Botany Bay should remain independent or
- The City of Botany Bay should amalgamate with the City of Sydney, Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra.

An overwhelming 96% of residents who responded said they wanted our City to remain independent.

The comments made during the survey process explained why local residents remain opposed to amalgamation. A small sample of these comments is provided here:

"Botany council should not be amalgamated as we are satisfied with our local team and their results," - Louise

"Botany has always done right by residents and we want to keep it that way," - Francis from Botany

"Botany Council for Botany, residents and local issues. Amalgamations only cause residents to become just a number with no say in local issues," - Tessie "Don't spoil our good Council," - Shirley from Hillsdale

"No complaints with Botany Council ... Don't try to fix what isn't broken," - Mark from Botany

"This council provides excellent service – I would not like to see it change," - anonymous

286 responses indicated support for the plan to merge.

Community Days

The Mayor and Councillors discussed amalgamation proposals with residents and stakeholders at local Community Days held throughout 2013.

In 2013 Council held six community days:

- Mascot Park (now Lionel Bowen Park), Mascot;
- · Garnet Jackson Park, Botany;
- · Eastlakes Reserve, Eastlakes;
- Grace Campbell Reserve, Hillsdale;
- L' Estrange Park, Mascot and
- · Rowland Park, Daceyville.

At each event residents' expressed their concerns about the proposed amalgamations. Residents indicated they were strongly opposed to Botany Bay joining the proposed "Global Sydney" model.

July/August 2014

A telephone and online community satisfaction survey was conducted in July/August 2014 to provide Council with a representative and random picture of how residents perceive the City of Botany Bay. A total of 815 residents responded. The majority of respondents said the services we provide are very important and that they were generally satisfied with Council's performance. All services identified in the survey showed a 'high satisfaction, high importance' outcome. Some 63% of respondents identified strongly with our local government area and the local community.

February 2015 - Hands Off Botany Campaign



Council conducted a second survey seeking residents' support in the form of a petition. The petition was delivered to all households in the City of Botany Bay. The purpose of the petition was to let the Minister for Local Government know our community opposed to a merger. To date, 1,389 residents have added their names to the petition declaring:

Dear Minister,

I am against the amalgamation of the City of Botany Bay with any other local government area.

I believe that Botany Bay should remain an independent Council, supported by the State Government to deliver the services and infrastructure the Botany Bay community needs today and into the future.

Community event - Chinese New Year Noodle Markets

On 21 February 2015, the City of Botany Bay hosted an information stand at the *Chinese New Year Noodle Markets* in Daceyville where residents again expressed their concern about the NSW Government's proposal to amalgamate the City of Botany Bay.

May 2015

In order to satisfy the NSW Government's requirements in June 2015 Council undertook a random telephone survey of approximately 500 local residents. The survey asked residents to nominate two preferences from the options presented, namely:

- · Remain independent;
- · Merge with Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra;
- · Merge with Randwick, Sydney, Waverley and Woollahra;
- · Merge with Sydney only; or
- · Merge with Rockdale and Marrickville.

The survey found an impressive 85% of local residents were satisfied with the City of Botany Bay and its services and 77% believed that the City of Botany Bay should remain independent. Residents cited their satisfaction with Council services, Council's strong financial management and local democracy as their reasons for supporting the City of Botany Bay to remain independent.

When required to choose a preferred merger model 36% of respondents nominated a merger with Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra as their choice. This model had the largest number of supporters in comparison to other merger options. The second most preferred merger model with 23% of respondents supporting was to merge with the City of Sydney. The NSW Government's preferred "Global Sydney" was by far the least popular model with only 8% respondents preferring this option. The most obvious outcomes from this survey were that no single merger option had community support and the vast majority of local residents strongly support the City of Botany Bay remaining independent.

Community Event- Eastlakes Multicultural Fair

On 13 June 2015, the City of Botany Bay held an information booth at its annual Multicultural Fair in Eastlakes again seeking feedback from residents. More than 1000 residents signed a petition show their support for the City of Botany Bay to remain independent.

MEDIA

Council utilises a variety of media to communicate with local residents and stakeholders on a number of issues of community interest. The Mayor runs a Facebook page through which he is able to interact with residents, uses the traditional medium of Mayoral Minutes at monthly Council meetings, media releases and columns in the local paper Southern Courier.

The City of Botany Bay's website features a dedicated section titled *Hands off Botany Bay* providing information and documentation regarding *Fit for the Future* and council's position.

FACEBOOK

Since 2013 Mayor Keneally has used a Facebook page as a way of interacting directly with local residents. The Mayor has discussed *Fit for the Future* on a number of occasions including 10 September 2014, 11 September 2014, 16 September 2014, 24 September 2014, 3 February 2015, 5 February 2015, 23 February 2015, 9 March 2015 and 24 March 2015. Samples of Facebook posts by the Mayor and responses received from residents have been included in this appendix.

MAYORAL COLUMNS

The Mayoral Column is published in the local paper *Southern Courier* every Tuesday. The Mayoral Column provides important information to the local community regarding Council facilities, events and services and other items of community interest. The Mayor has published a number of Mayoral Columns regarding *Fit for the Future* and the City of Botany Bay's response. Mayoral Columns concerning this matter include 6 April 2013, 14 May 2013, 28 May 2013, 4 June 2013, 18 June 2013, 16 July 2013, 21 January 2014, 16 September 2014, 3 February 2015 and 26 May 2015. MEDIA RELEASES

Mayor Keneally has kept the community informed about Fir for the Future through state and local media.

Using media releases the Mayor has drawn attention to inconsistencies in the government's policies, discussed specific merger proposals raised by the NSW Government and third parties and criticised the NSW Government's obfuscation and refusal to rule out forcing amalgamations. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

April - August 2013

The City of Botany Bay holds Community Days throughout our City, the issue of *Fit for the Future* is discussed.

June - July 2013

First Survey – Residents are asked to choose between City of Botany Bay remaining independent and the "Global Sydney" merger option proposed by the Independent Local Government Review Panel.

July/August 2014

The City of Botany Bay engages Jetty Research to undertake a community satisfaction survey of local residents as part of the *Vision 2040* Process. Among a number of matters, this poll asks residents to rate their satisfaction with Council and Botany Bay as a place to live. Four focus groups were held to discuss Council's vision for the City and the *Fit for the Future* process.

September 2014

Mayor Ben Keneally writes to the Minister for Local Government and the Premier requesting their position whether the NSW Government will force mergers if Local Councilschoose not to participate in voluntary mergers.

December 2014

Response from the Minister for Local Government received. However the Minister refuses to address the issue of whether 'no forced amalgamations' remain NSW Government policy.

Mayor writes to the Minister for Local Government and asks, for a second time, that he commit to the NSW Government's previous position of 'no forced amalgamations'.

February 2015

Council launches the webpage for the campaign *Hands off Botany Bay*.

February 2015

Mayor Ben Keneally writes to the Minister of Local Government for a third time after the Liberal Member for Coogee stated 'the Baird government maintains the policy of no forced amalgamations'. The Mayor asks that the Minister confirm this position or state whether the Member for Coogee was incorrect.

February 2015

At a Council sponsored event *Chinese New Year Noodle Markets* the City of Botany Bay provides information about *Fit for the Future* and the City of Botany Bay *Hands off Botany Bay* campaign.

February - March 2015

Residents are asked to sign up to the *Hands off Botany Bay* campaign. Flyers from this leaflet are sent to the Minister for Local Government to demonstrate the extent of opposition to merger proposals among our local community.

April 2015

Mayor writes to the Minster for Local Government a fourth time asking that the Minister confirm whether the Government maintains its prior position of 'no forced amalgamations'.

May 2015

Jetty Research undertakes a third survey of local residents on behalf of Council. This provides residents with five options:

- · Botany Bay remains independent;
- · Botany Bay merges with Randwick only;
- Global Sydney merger of Botany Bay, Randwick, Sydney, Waverley and Woollahra;
- · Botany Bay merges with Sydney only; or
- "Airport Council" Botany Bay merges with Rockdale and Marrickville

Residents are asked to choose at least two options.

June 2015

At the City of Botany Bay Multicultural Fair, Council hosts a stall to advise residents of latest developments in *Fit for the Future* potential mergers and hear the local community's concerns about Council position.

In Mayoral Minute Number 3 of 2015 the Councillors of the City of Botany Bay resolved that should the NSW Government move to force amalgamations, Council will conduct a poll of local residents under the Local Government Act 1993.



Re: Local government reform process

Thank you for your letter dated 22 May 2015 concerning the NSW Government's local government reform process.

I am pleased to confirm with you the strong, productive and close working relationship Sydney Airport has historically had, and continues to have with, the City of Botany Bay Council.

Your letter lists a number of matters which will be used by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal for assessment purposes. Of those where Sydney Airport has had direct experience with your council, I can advise as follows:

Our ability to employ a wide range of skilled staff

Sydney Airport holds in very high regard the skilled staff of the City of Botany Bay Council. We regularly deal with yourself, general manager Ms Lara Kirchner and other senior officers on a range of matters of mutual interest. These include planning and development, traffic management, landscaping and specific aviation-related issues (such as airspace protection and the like).

Our superior strategic planning and policy development skills

Sydney Airport has appreciated the quality of City of Botany Bay's strategic planning and policy development skills. There is regular and productive liaison between our respective organisations on planning and development proposals in the vicinity of the airport. For example, we have worked closely with council's senior planners concerning implementation of the National Airports Safeguarding Framework (NASF). Given the complex aviation-related and safety issues raised in the NASF, there are significant challenges in implementing it at the local government level. We have found council's planners highly receptive to the need to ensure these issues are properly addressed. We were especially pleased that the City of Botany Bay Council became the first council in NSW to formally recognise the NASF in its development control plan, a significant outcome in itself.

Effective regional collaboration

The City of Botany Bay Council has long exercised a leadership role in the Southern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (SSROC). The role of SSROC - which has 16 member councils - is to undertake projects that cross council boundaries achieving results that will contribute to the

SSROC regularly makes submissions to Sydney Airport's master plans and major development plans.

Our credibility for effective advocacy

Sydney Airport's experience is that the City of Botany Bay Council – at both mayoral, general manager and senior officer level – are credible and effective advocates for their LGA. We regularly interact in various forums and meetings at which council's position on the matter at hand is clearly and effectively articulated.

Specifically in the context of airports, council has always taken a leadership role in aviation-related advocacy concerning issues that affect both local government and airports. The formation of the Australian Mayoral Aviation Council (AMAC) is a good example. As you know, AMAC was an initiative of your council and is currently chaired by yourself. In recognition of its important role, AMAC is also directly represented on the federal Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development's Aviation Industry Consultative Council, with the representative being a senior officer of your council.

Our ability and resources to cope with complex and unexpected change

The abovementioned example showing council's ability to respond to the complex issues raised in the NASF is a good example of council's ability in this regard.

High quality political and managerial leadership

We have historically found the leadership of yourself, your predecessor, your general manager and senior council officials to be effective, proactive and high quality.

I am a former resident of the City of Botany Bay and I have conducted a Law Practice at Mascot since 1986. I have been a landowner and ratepayer in the City of Botany Bay since 1989.

I give my wholehearted support to the Council of the City of Botany Bay to remain a stand alone council despite the current baseless and hysterical push to force Councils in New South Wales into amalgamation for the sake of amalgamation per se.

Botany Bay Council (BBCC) is probably the only council in New South Wales which is actually liked by its constituents. The Labour Party councillors in the area romp in elections, sometimes having polled over 80% of the vote. That tells you that the Council has the overall confidence of its constituents.

BBCC is one of the few councils which not only enhances the quality of life for its constituents but it also has caused property values to increase at a spectacular rate since approximately 1995 onwards. Particularly in the Botany area, large tracts of industrial lands have been turned into residential which has seen a plethora of exciting new residential dwellings replace old factories. At the same time BBCC has spent a fortune (yet remained debt free) on landscaping and streetscape works throughout its Council area which makes the area look good and feel good.

BBCC is well equipped to not only manage the affairs of our local community in a professional and positive manner; its experience, foresight and judgement make it more than capable to cope with any complex or unexpected change and to deal with Regional and State bodies on a regular basis.

At the moment we have a Council that has been politically stable and exceptionally popular for approximately 30 years. Throughout that time the people of this area have received superb service from our Council and our Council has improved the life of its constituents. I cannot imagine how the people of Botany Bay would benefit from an amalgamation with other councils.

Re: Fit for the Future Criteria

I am responding to your letter dated 5 June 2015.

This letter is in support of the City of Botany Bay. Orica is a major landholder within the City of Botany Bay, and as such has many interactions with Council. These range from property dealings, environmental matters, community issues and traffic.

The Council shows a strong interest in community affairs, with a Councillor and officer regularly attending the community meetings which Orica holds bi-monthly regarding its remediation activities at the Botany Industrial Park.

The landscape and demographic of the Botany area has changed significantly over recent decades and Botany Council is required to service a wide diversity of industry and residential needs. Orica believes that Council is a trusted and credible advocate for the local community.

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Executive summary

The City of Botany Bay commissioned Jetty Research to conduct a random and representative telephone survey of its adult residents, to understand community views regarding the NSW State Government's "Fit for the Future" (FFF) local government reform process. More specifically, Council was keen to test resident opinion on: whether or not COBB should attempt to remain an independent council; and, should a merger be forced, preferred partners.

In order to ensure that respondents were able to provide an informed opinion on the topic, within a tight project timeframe, the following three-stage surveying model was agreed:

- 1. Jetty Research contacted 1,133 adult COBB residents who had been randomly recruited by telephone in July-2014 for a separate and unrelated survey, to see if they (a) still lived in the COBB; and (b) were willing to participate in another Council survey. Note that no subject matter was disclosed at this stage. Of this original sampling frame, 1,089 residents made themselves available to be surveyed or at least declined to opt-out.
- 2. These 1,089 were then emailed or mailed an 8-page information booklet prepared by the COBB on the subject of local government reform see Appendix 1.
- 3. Jetty Research partner, Taverner Research, then phoned residents, using a survey instrument prepared by Jetty Research and COBB (see Appendix 2). Once they had confirmed having read the document, residents were entitled to commence the survey. Due to time limitations, the number of respondents was capped at 500.

Surveying was conducted between June 1st and June 11th. In all, 500 telephone interviews were conducted. Random sampling error for this survey was 4.4 per cent at the 95 per cent confidence level.

Among the survey's major conclusions:

- 1. 85 per cent of respondents said they were satisfied with Council and its services, against 14 per cent dissatisfied.
- 2. 81 per cent claimed prior awareness of the FFF program. Of these, 83 per cent said they were "very" or "quite" interested in the subject of Council reform.
- 3. 77 per cent of respondents believed that the City of Botany Bay should remain independent, against 19 per cent believing it should merge with one or more of its neighbours.
- 4. Main reasons for supporting the status quo were satisfaction with current council (34 per cent), a perception that COBB was sustainable and/or had no debt (32 per cent), that there was no need for change (28 per cent) and that the current model provided more autonomy or control (22 per cent). Among those favouring a merger, reasons included perceived economies of scale (6 per cent), improved governance (6 per cent) and reduced duplication (5 per cent).
- 5. If forced to choose a merger partner, 36 per cent chose the Randwick/Waverley/Woollahra option. A merger with the City of Sydney alone was chosen by 23 per cent of those surveyed, while 17 per cent preferred the Rockdale/Marrickville option. Just 8 per cent nominated the so-called "Global City" model.



- 6. Conversely, 32 per cent proposed Rockdale/Marrickville as their least preferred merger partner. The two models incorporating the City of Sydney were selected by 23 per cent each, while only 11 per cent rejected the Randwick/Waverley/Woollahra model.
- 7. When asked specifically how supportive they were of the COBB joining with the City of Sydney, Waverley, Woollahra and Randwick to form the so-called "Global City" council, only 19 per cent were supportive while 79 per cent were opposed.

Introduction

Background

In May 2015, the City of Botany Bay (COBB) commissioned Jetty Research to conduct a random and representative telephone survey of its adult residents to understand community opinion relating to the NSW State government-proposed local government boundary changes – the so called "Fit for the Future" reforms. Specific survey objectives were as follows:

- 1. Measure awareness of, and interest in Council reform;
- 2. Measure support for Council's preferred (stand-alone) model;
- 3. Measure support for other merger options;
- 4. Understand reasons behind different merger preferences;
- 5. Maintain simple and neutral language to ensure credibility with external stakeholders.

Methodology

In order to ensure that respondents were able to provide an informed opinion on the topics, and within a tight project timeframe, the following three-stage surveying model was agreed:

- 1. In late May, Jetty Research contacted 1,133 adult COBB residents who had been randomly recruited by telephone in July-2014 for a separate and unrelated survey, to see if they (a) still lived in the COBB; and (b) were willing to participate in another Council survey. Note that no subject matter was disclosed at this stage. Of this original sampling frame, 1,089 residents made themselves available to be surveyed or at least declined to opt-out.
- 2. These 1,089 were then emailed or mailed an 8-page information booklet prepared by the COBB on the subject of local government reform see Appendix 1.
- 3. Jetty Research partner, Taverner Research, then phoned residents using a survey instrument prepared by Jetty Research and COBB (see Appendix 2). Once they had confirmed having read the document, residents were entitled to commence the survey. Due to time limitations, the number of respondents was capped at 500.

Surveying was conducted between June 1st and June 11th 2015. Respondents were called by Taverner research from 3.30-8pm each weekday afternoon (excluding Friday), and on Saturday afternoon from midday to 5pm. Residents were called up to five times at different times of the afternoon or evening.

In all, 500 interviews were conducted. Average survey length was 8.5 minutes.

Data has been post-weighted to reflect the demographics of the City of Botany Bay by age and gender, based on 2011 ABS Census data.


Where differences in this report are classed as significant, this implies they are statistically significant based on independent sample t-scores or other analysis of variation (or ANOVA) calculations. In statistical terms, significant differences are unlikely to have been caused by chance alone.

Sampling error

Given that respondents to this survey were randomly recruited by telephone (albeit for a different research project), we believe that the randomness condition has been met.

According to the 2011 ABS Census (Usual Resident profile) the total population of the City of Botany Bay was 39,354, of which 30,967 (79%) were aged 18 and over. Based on this latter survey population, a random sample of 500 adult residents implies a margin for error of +/- 4.4 per cent at the 95 per cent confidence level. (This means in effect that if we conducted a similar poll twenty times, results should reflect the views and behaviour of the overall survey population to within a +/- 4.4 per cent margin in 19 of those 20 surveys.)

As Graph i shows, margin for error falls as sample size rises. Hence cross-tabulations or sub-groups within the overall sample will typically create much higher margins for error than the overall sample. For example using the above population sizes, a sample size of 100 exhibits a margin for error of +/- 9.8 per cent (again at the 95 per cent confidence level).




Graph i: How sampling error varies with sample and population size

In addition to the random sampling error, above, there may also be some forms of non-random sampling error which may have affected results. These include respondents without fixed line phones, non-response bias within the original survey recruitment; and/or imperfections in the original survey database.



Graph ii: Respondent breakdown by age (weighted)




Graph iii: Respondent breakdown by gender (weighted)






Graph iv: Respondent breakdown by suburb of residence (unweighted)





Part 1: Satisfaction with Council

The survey commenced with a question asking respondents how satisfied they were with their Council and its services, "not just on one or two issues, but across all areas of its responsibilities."



Graph 1.1: How satisfied are you with the performance of your Council and its services?

Council scored extremely highly on this measure, with 85 per cent of respondents satisfied and just 14 per cent dissatisfied – for net satisfaction of 71 per cent.

Older residents were particularly happy, with some 58 per cent of those aged 60-plus declaring themselves "very satisfied". Females were also more likely to declare themselves satisfied than males, at 92 and 79 per cent respectively.




Part 2: Awareness of, and interest in Council reform

Respondents were next asked whether they had been aware of the local government reform program prior to the survey, and how interested they were in the subject of council reform.

Were you aware of the (FFF) reform program prior to this survey? (n=500) No 19% Yes 81%

Graph 2.1: Prior to this survey, were you aware of the (Fit for the Future) reform program?

Eight in ten respondents (81 per cent) claimed to have been aware of the Fit for the Future discussion prior to being surveyed on the subject. This included 85 per cent of those aged over 60, and 83 per cent of males.



Graph 2.2: (If yes) How interested are you personally in the subject of Council reform?



Thirty one per cent of those respondents previously aware of the FFF reform program claimed to be very interested in the subject of council reform, with a further 52 per cent saying they were "quite interested".

Interest was relatively consistent by age and gender. Although 34 per cent of respondents 60-plus declared themselves "very interested", against 26 per cent of those aged 18-44, this difference is not considered statistically significant.




Part 3: Support for different options

Respondents were next informed that:

"In the case of the City of Botany Bay, the state government has published a report recommending that the city merge with four other councils. Under the Fit for the Future process, council must consider this option, and may consider other options. These include: remaining independent; merging with Randwick, Waverly and Woollahra Councils; merging with the City of Sydney only; merging with Waverley, Randwick, City of Sydney and Woollahra councils; or merging with Rockdale and Marrickville Councils."

They were then asked. "Thinking generally about mergers, which of the following statements best reflects your views on this subject?" and read three statements (with the "independent" and "merger" options rotated):

Graph 3.1: Thinking generally about mergers, which of the following statements best reflects your views on this subject?



More than three-quarters of respondents (77 per cent) felt that the City of Botany Bay should remain independent.²

Among females and those aged 60-plus, support for Botany remaining independent was even higher (at 84 and 86 per cent respectively). However younger residents were also supportive of the stand-alone option, with 72 per cent of those aged 18-44 supporting this model.



Slightly less than one in five respondents (19 per cent) supported the merger option, with 4 per cent unsure.

Respondents were then asked, in an unprompted question, why they supported their preferred option. Their answers have been coded (i.e. themed) and are shown in Graph 3.2, below:



Graph 3.2: Can you briefly explain why you think this? (unprompted)


Among those seeking the COBB to remain independent, the main reasons given were that they were happy with the current council (34 per cent of all respondents), that the current council provided good services, were financially sustainable and/or had no debt (32 per cent), and/or that they could see no rationale for change (28 per cent). Twenty two per cent felt that the current council provided residents with greater autonomy than a merged model, and 19 per cent believed that Botany offered superior services to other (generally neighbouring) councils. Meanwhile 16 per cent felt Botany was a good size, and/or that a merged council would be too large.

Of those supporting a merger, main reasons were perceptions that a larger council would: provide economies of scale (6 per cent); lead to improved governance (also 6 per cent) and/or cut duplication (5 per cent). A further 5 per cent based on their reason on being dissatisfied with the current Council.



Respondents were next asked, "If the NSW government forced Council to merge with one or more of its neighbouring councils, which of the following merger options would you prefer?" Again the four offered options were rotated to avoid order bias.

Graph 3.3: If the NSW government forced Council to merge, which of the following merger options would you prefer?



Forced to choose, slightly over one in three respondents (36 per cent) preferred the Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra model. Twenty three per cent felt a merger with the City of Sydney (alone) would be the best option, while 17 per cent preferred to go with Rockdale and Marrickville. Just 8 per cent supported the so-called "Global City" option, while 16 per cent were unsure or supported none of the models offered.

Results were relatively consistent by age and gender.

However as shown in Table 3.1 (next page), there were some statistically significant differences in response depending on whether the respondent had earlier preferred the independent or merger option:

This indicates that those preferring the merger model initially were significantly more supportive of the Randwick/Waverley/Woollahra model than those seeking continued independence for COBB (at 51 and 32 per cent respectively). However it remained the preferred model for both groups.

Respondents were next asked why they preferred their particular choice. A selection of representative comments is shown below:

Prefer Randwick/Waverley/Woollahra (36%):

"I prefer this option because we are also part of the eastern suburbs and I am familiar with those councils. Also I don't like Clover Moore."

"Randwick is very close and so is Woollahra and they both have good reputations for services and debt."

"I believe it would cover sufficient populations to effect economies of scale. It would leave the CBD to look after its own specific issues."

"More like minded and similar socio- economic bracket and similar demographics."

Prefer City of Sydney-only (23%):

"The City of Sydney perform better than most of the others. They have good libraries and parks."

"Because it is the only one without debts."

"Good size and manageable, and the others could be too big."

"I don't like a whole lot of individual councils merging together. Clover Moore isn't doing a bad job."

"As we are only 5km from the city we are virtually neighbours. It would benefit in terms of public transport."



Prefer Waverley/Randwick/City of Sydney/Woollahra (8%):

"I think that there will be fewer councillors and mayors and we will be saving money on this."

"If it is going to be big it might as well have all of them included and be very big and give us more resources."

"The bigger the better - by merging with more there will be less councils involved and this could save money."

"It is time for a change. It will save ratepayers money and unify regulations. Building code, waste disposal and general maintenance."

Prefer Rockdale and Marrickville (17%):

"They are a smaller grouping of councils."


"They have similar issues dealing having to deal with planes and ports"

"I think the socio economic and expectations are changing and they seem familiar and comparable demographics with the same social expectations."

"Similar people and issues and Waverley could be too uppity"

Residents were next asked which of the possible merger options they would *least* prefer:

Almost one-third of those surveyed said that the Rockdale/Marrickville merger option was their least preferred choice. Opposition to the City of Sydney (alone) and the so-called "Global City" option were similar at 23 per cent apiece, while only 11 per cent cited the Randwick/Waverley/ Woollahra model as their least preferred (of the four choices offered).

In this instance, those originally supporting the merger option were significantly more likely to reject the Rockdale/Marrickville option, while those preferring COBB to remain independent were split almost equally between the City of Sydney (alone), Global City and Rockdale/Marrickville options as their least preferred choices.

Again, respondents were asked to explain their choice. A representative sample of comments for each least preferred option is shown below:

Least prefer Randwick/Waverley/Woollahra (11%):

"Randwick council is a basket case often. It is often under administrators and then six months later they are in trouble again."

"Our council is much better in looking after us. Also there are much wealthier people in those council areas and their rates reflect their earnings."

"No Woollahra and Waverley. They are affluent and we are more middle class. There class means money - we just want the basics done."



Least prefer City of Sydney-only (23%):

"Rates would be too expensive, and City of Sydney covers too large an area and may have too many high rises."

"I don't like what they are doing to the city, like cycle lanes and blockages."

"I don't like Clover Moore's ideas. They are not within our area and Botany has a totally different atmosphere to City of Sydney."

"I just think it is too big a council and we will be swamped by it."

Least prefer Waverley/Randwick/City of Sydney/Woollahra (23%):

"I think we would be gobbled up and it takes in a large income area and there are a lot of differences in these areas financially - to compare Mascot area with Vaucluse etc. is ridiculous."

"This council would be too big/monstrous and unwieldy"

"I don't like this option because it's too big and not personal enough, you can't find who is accountable and communication would not be easy."

"Because it has Randwick in it."

Least prefer Rockdale and Marrickville (32%):

"It is a different demographic with older suburbs and different needs."

"I feel the needs are too different between these councils and Botany. I believe we need to remain with the eastern suburbs area."


"Mainly from the financial side I would not like to merge with debt ridden councils, they would drag the Botany council down financially. At first I liked the idea but when I looked at their financial situation I changed my mind."

"We have no knowledge of their councils"

"These councils have had problems with corruption".

Putting the most/least preferred options side by side highlights three things:


- The Randwick/Woollahra/Waverley model has the highest level of support, and lowest level of strong opposition;
- The Rockdale/Marrickville and Global City models have the lowest levels of support, and highest levels of opposition;
- There are relatively even levels of support for, and opposition to the City of Sydney-only model.



Part 4: Support for the 'Global City' concept

The survey concluded with a specific question asking residents how supportive they were of "the City of Botany Bay joining with the City of Sydney, Waverley, Randwick and Woollahra to form a so-called 'Global City' council". Respondents were offered one of four prompted options.

Graph 4.1: How supportive are you of the City of Botany Bay joining the City of Sydney, Waverley, Randwick and Woollahra to form a so-called "Global City" council?



There was very little backing for this model, with 19 per cent supportive against 79 per cent opposed.


Opposition was consistent by age, while men were more likely to be supportive than women (at 25 and 15 per cent respectively).

Among those initially preferring COBB to remain independent, only 9 per cent supported the Global City model. This compares with 58 per cent of those initially favouring a merger.



JUNE 2013

We conducted a voluntary survey of 17,000 households asking for your views on whether

JULY/AUGUST 2014

A Telephone and chiline/paper survey was conducted in July/August 2014 to provide Council with a representative and random picture of how residents parceive the City of Boteny Bay. 815 residents responded. In summary, the imajority of respondents consider that the services we provide are very important and they are generally satisfied with our performance. 

A second survey seeking community support in the form of a petition was sent to residents. The purpose of the petition was to let the Minister for Local Government know our community's views on any merger proposal. To date, 1,389 residents have added their names to the petition declaring:

Dear Minister,

I am against the amalgamation of the City of Botany Bay with any other local government area.

I believe that Botany Bay should remain an independent Council, supported by the State Government to deliver the services and infrastructure the Botany Bay community needs today and into the future.

MAY 2015

Council is also undertaking a random telephone survey of our residents. The survey will ask residents to nominate two preferences from the options explored, namely:

- 1. Remain independent
- 2. Merge with Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra
- 3. Merge with Randwick, Sydney, Waverley and Woollahra
- 4. Merge with Sydney only
- 5. Merge with Rockdale and Marrickville.

We will also consider conducting a poll of residents under the Local Government Act 1993 if forced amalgamations were to occur.





WHAT'S NEXT

Once we have received your feedback, Council will finalise our submission.

Submissions are due by 30 June 2015 and will be assessed by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART).

IPART will provide the Minister for Local Government and the Premier with a final report by 16 October 2015 identifying whether or not individual councils are 'fit' or 'unfit' and the reasons for this assessment. The report will be publicly released following Cabinet approval.

Please note that the Cumberland Livestock Health and Pest Authority will be conducting a rabbit baiting program on behalf of Botany Bay City Council using pindone carrots at:

Botany Golf Course, Botany Road, Banksmeadow

A free feeding program will be undertaken before baiting commences. Baiting (using poison carrots) will commence on Wednesday 1 May 2013 and continue until Friday 31 May 2013 (weather permitting). As leaders in our local community we understand the benefits of sharing resources, and in fact we do this through the Regional Councils such as the Southern Sydney Region of Councils to which our City belongs. 

Councillor Glinatsis informed Council last Wednesday that he felt it was time to relinquish the title, however, he was still committed to serving Council and working tirelessly for his constituents in Ward 1 and the residents of our great City. I thank Cr Glinatsis for the outstanding job he has done as Deputy Mayor over the last 20 years. It is not an easy role to fill, but it is a role Cr Glinatsis carried out with great pride and integrity. Cr Glinatsis will remain a very important member of council representing his ward and serving on various committees.

Councillor Stan Kondilios was elected as our new Deputy Mayor. Councillor Kondilios experience and knowledge as a lawyer, practicing in the environmental and planning fields, is an asset to Council. I look forward to working more closely with him in the coming months as my deputy.

Amalgamations still on the agenda

This week I call on the Baird Government to come clean about their intentions on amalgamations. The Government is currently forcing councils to spend much needed funds to conduct polls and information campaigns without clearly stating whether they intend to listen to the people or just ignore the information and force councils to amalgamate.

I have called on the Premier to outline the Government's policy and seek a formal mandate at the upcoming election in March. If the Government intends to force amalgamations on Councils without popular support, then it should have the decency to admit that to the people. I will continue to make sure that local democracy is preserved and that the City of Botany Bay remains independent.

MAYORAL MINUTE NO 10

Meeting 28 November 2012

3. Proposed Council Amalgamations

The last week saw the release of yet another review paper from the State Government.

The Local Government Independent Review Panel released a paper entitled "The Case for Sustainable Change". I'm pleased they didn't think there was a case for unsustainable change.

The paper makes interesting reading. It endorses the benefits of a popularly elected Mayor with true executive authority, much as we already have in Botany Bay. It acknowledges that the challenges and opportunities for local government vary dramatically across the state and that "one size fits all" is no solution. Surprisingly, the paper spends almost no effort on questions of how to improve democratic accountability for Councils. Like most bureaucratic documents it seems to regard the notion of democratic accountability with suspicion.

The section on boundaries and amalgamation is rather unsatisfactory. It makes unsourced claims that efficiency and innovation will be improved through amalgamations, despite extensive academic literature that finds the benefits are very limited above a certain minimum efficient scale, and that most differences in performance above that point can be explained by differences in leadership and management.

Let me make clear my beliefs on this matter: Given the current service delivery and regulatory responsibilities of Council there is no benefit to be gained for our residents from amalgamation.

Indeed, local communities will only suffer from more remote decision making with less real understanding of local concerns. Government here in the City of Botany Bay is very local. And it works better because of that.

Now, there is a case to be made that a broader range of government services could be delivered more effectively by local government. That's what happens in many international jurisdictions. There is a case to be made that these additional services can be better delivered by larger local governments. But we have seen no proposals along these lines from the State Government.

On the back of this Case for Change paper, many have started to speculate that the State Government is planning a round of forced Council Of course, with this government you know that any amalgamations. amalgamations will be based on politics rather than on policy.

In our local region we already have unedifying evidence that the Liberal Party is seeking to use amalgamations to further their own partisan cause. In a concerted effort across Randwick, Woollahra and Waverley Councils, Liberal members have indicated their support for merging those three areas. Of course they haven't even spoken to the fourth Council in this region about their plans. This time it's not that they look down their Tory noses at our area – rather it's about a naked political calculation – it's about furthering their own party interests and not including a Labor voting area in their planned Eastern Suburbs Super Council.

Well here in Botany Bay we put community interests first. There is no benefit for our residents in an Eastern Suburbs Super Council. We have excellent community assets and no debt. We have highly responsive and accountable Councillors in our highly democratic system of one Councillor per ward. Any amalgamation would put all this at risk.

Without a genuine commitment to devolving more service delivery responsibility to local government, there is no point talking about amalgamation.

Local Government Reform

At the last meeting of Council we made our views clear on the State Government's report on the future of Local Government. However, it appears from recent reports that the Liberal Government will move quickly next year to force amalgamations. Indeed a motion recently moved by Liberal and Green Councillors at Randwick Council shows they are eager to obtain our assets but not to represent our residents.

To ensure our residents are treated fairly and with respect by the State Government, we must clearly state that our policy is as follows:-

- i. The interests of our residents must come first in any consideration of Local Government amalgamation.
- ii. Without a proposal that includes substantial reform to the role of State and Local Governments, there is no case that service levels to our residents will be enhanced through amalgamation, indeed the opposite is likely.
- Council to urgently write to the Premier and the Minister for Local iii. Government to ascertain if they remain committed to their pre-election promise that there will be no forced amalgamations.
- İ۷. Unless the government provides a prompt, absolute and unequivocal commitment that they will not pursue forced amalgamation, then the City of Botany Bay Council will provide residents with a voice through a poll to be held on 2 March 2013, under section 14 of the Local Government Act as follows:

"14.A council may take a poll of electors for its information and quidance on any matter"

1. Amalgamation Threat and Council's Response

The drumbeat for forced Council amalgamations is growing.

I met with the Independent Panel members at a SSROC event last week. It was clear from discussions that the Panel is committed to recommending amalgamations. This is despite a complete lack of evidence that size has any impact on efficiency, strategic capability or resident satisfaction in local government. The Panel indicated that a draft report containing recommended new boundaries will be released to the public in the third week of April. The Panel also indicated that they would be making recommendations regarding the processes required to achieve amalgamations and left open the possibility this could include forced amalgamations.

The State Government remains non-committal on whether it will maintain its commitment to no forced amalgamations following the completion of the report.

Based on community feedback to me and to other members of Council, and on historical responses when amalgamation has been promoted in the past, I have no doubt that the local community will be opposed to any proposed amalgamation.

My concern is that they may not get a say.

We need to be ready to act to ensure that the community has a voice in this process.

This Mayoral Minute therefore authorises the following actions:

- 1. The Mayor to use his Mayoral column to alert the community to this threat
- 2. The preparation of a mail out to all residents and ratepayers to be sent immediately on the release of the draft Panel report, containing information on the recommendations regarding the City of Botany Bay and a postage paid card that allows residents and ratepayers to sign a petition against amalgamation of the City of Botany Bay
- 3. The commencement of preparations to hold a poll of all electors in the City of Botany Bay on the question of amalgamations, ideally timed to coordinate with other Councils
- 4. The obtaining of any legal advice and opinions relating to this matter

I move that this Minute be received.

1. **Metropolitan Mayors' Association**

On 10 April 2013 I met with Mayors or Delegates from 14 Sydney metropolitan councils at a forum hosted by the City of Canterbury to discuss the formation of a new peak body to represent the common interests of councils in the Sydney Metropolitan Area.

The forum expressed concern over the effectiveness of Local Government Association NSW in its advocacy role and consultation with and on behalf of Sydney Metropolitan councils in a number of important areas, including Planning Reform, the Independent Review of Local Government, currently being conducted, the foreshadowed early intervention legislation and the Review of the Local Government Act.

The consensus of the forum was that Sydney Metropolitan Mayors should form an association that would focus on the Sydney metropolitan area and collaborate and consult with the Federal and NSW Governments to represent the common and emerging issues affecting councils in the Sydney metropolitan area on the future of this region. We noted that rural Councils are already represented via the Country Mayors' Association.

The new body would be known as the Metropolitan Mayors' Association (MMA). The Forum agreed:

- 1. The Councils of the Sydney metropolitan area share many common interests, including planning systems and regulations, infrastructure issues, economic development and the regulation of the local government sector.
- 2. The Councils of the Sydney metropolitan area want an efficient, consultative, cost effective and member focused organisation to coordinate action and advocacy on matters of shared interest.

The 14 Councils being broadly representative of NSROC, SHOROC and SSROC at the meeting agreed to submit a Mayoral Minute to their next available Council meeting seeking a resolution for the purpose of forming the MMA.

Canterbury City Council (SSROC) has agreed to write to all Councils in Metropolitan Sydney encouraging them to consider becoming a member of the Metropolitan Mayors' Association and to coordinate responses. Subject to receipt of responses, an inaugural meeting of the MMA will occur as soon as practicable.

RECOMMENDATION

That Council support the formation and membership of a Sydney Metropolitan 1. Mayors' Association and advise Canterbury City Council of this decision.

2. Amalgamation Update

I continue to work to keep the City of Botany Bay independent.

Mayors from six council areas, including the City of Botany Bay, have joined together to oppose the O'Farrell Government's call for the proposed "Global City" merger. These councils are Botany Bay, City of Sydney, Leichardt, Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra.

The Councils have developed a joint submission that highlights the need for our six councils to remain independent.

Survey Cards from residents continue to be received at my office. As of Friday 21 June, 6,415 have called for the City of Botany to remain Independent and 256 to amalgamate. So far almost one third of all cards have been returned, with an impressive 96.2 percent of these voting against amalgamation.

The strong results from the amalgamation survey demonstrate that our community overwhelmingly supports the City of Botany Bay to remain independent.

The next step in our campaign will be to draw attention to the outstanding issue of county councils. The Independent Local Government Review Panel's paper *Twenty Essential Steps Future Directions for NSW Local Government* released in April 2013 explores the potential to establish county councils.

I believe that the proposed County Councils represent a "stealth amalgamation" agenda. The panel's report says "the Local Government Act already contains flexible provision in relation to the establishment and operation of County Councils. With a few minor amendments, those provisions can be used to create the type of organisation the Panel has in mind".

In reality, this would completely undercut the role of local councils. They would become powerless and meaningless. Amalgamation would be accomplished by stealth. This approach must be resisted.

The Panel writes "Stronger regional governance must be a central plank of local government reform". The report goes on to say "ROCs (Regional Organisations of Councils) have played a valuable role in regional advocacy and shared service delivery, but they are rarely strong in both". The Panel concludes "not all councils are members of ROCs, their performance is patchy and they tend to wax and wane".

The Panel's position on Regional Organisations of Councils, much like their position on local government in general, is based on assumptions, generalisations and fabrications. Not once do they offer any evidence for their alarmingly broad claims.

As Councillors are aware the City of Botany Bay is part of the South Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (SSROC). SSROC arranges inter-council procurement and co-ordinates services for sixteen local government areas, providing services for more than 1.4 million residents in Sydney.

SSROC had a 2011/12 Budget of approximately \$2.5 million, including both revenue and expenditure. SSROC undertakes contracts on a regional basis and through these contracts has achieved significant savings for member councils. These savings amount to \$20.7 million per annum, with an estimated \$105 million in savings over the past 10 years.

The continuing strong performance of SSROC and of the City of Botany Bay, demonstrates why well managed councils, regardless of size, can reap the benefits of Regional Organisations of Councils without the disadvantages of wholesale amalgamation or county councils.

I move this minute be adopted.

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MAYORAL MINUTE NO 8

Meeting 25 September 2013

3. One year of serving the community

Local Government is a unique and essential tier of our Government. No other branch of Government is as open and accessible to its constituents. Local Councillors are expected to be familiar with the minutiae of their ward. I know of no other Government officials who publish their mobile numbers and encourage constituents to call them!

This month we mark twelve months since the 2012 Local Government Elections. Twelve months ago the people of the City of Botany Bay overwhelmingly endorsed the work of my predecessor Ron Hoenig and chose myself and you, my fellow Councillors, to serve as their chosen representatives. Since then we have had a busy twelve months delivering for our community.

The most significant development has been the ongoing campaign against amalgamations. The survey we undertook with our residents was a resounding success and showed that we are on the right track. In total 6,965 survey forms were returned. This represents a response rate of 24%. In total 6,692 residents or about 96% indicated they would prefer that the City of Botany Bay remain independent, while only 283 residents indicated they would prefer that the City of Botany Bay was amalgamated. The high response rate and overwhelming support for continued independence demonstrate the strong support for the City of Botany Bay in our local community. I will continue to work to ensure that the City of Botany Bay remains independent.

On 1 July 2013 the Botany Bay Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2013 came into effect. The LEP establishes planning provisions for land within the City of Botany Bay under section 33A of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979. The LEP aims to guide and encourage sustainable economic growth and development, identify and conserve heritage items of environmental and cultural significance. The LEP will create a liveable urban space through the promotion of design excellence in all elements of the built environment and protect

residential amenity. The LEP also designates which land within our city can be used for Residential and other purposes.

In 2013 Council has developed the Draft City of Botany Bay Development Control Plan (DCP). So far a number of submissions have been received to the DCP including those from government agencies, constituents and businesses. Council is presently in the process of reviewing submissions. The Draft DCP reinforces Council's Commitment to providing new housing stock in our community. Over the past six years Council has approved over three thousand new units in our local government area. Over the past year approvals for new developments in the City of Botany Bay were the same as Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra Councils combined. Our community is a key growth area with a dynamic future. However Council has a responsibility to ensure responsible development which meets the needs of our current and future residents. The Draft DCP is designed to meet our current and future needs.

In the 2013-14 Budget a major change was introduced to the management of waste services in our community. For the first time the City of Botany Bay has issued commingled, 240L wheelie bins for recycling. As a result of having larger recycling bins our recycling service will change from a weekly to a fortnightly service. The change-over was undertaken in August to September and has now been completed, with recycling services rolled out throughout our community.

In 2013 Council has been working to improve the way we communicate and engage with our residents. Council has been working to improve our use of Social Media. I have established a Mayoral facebook page and a Mayoral twitter account to provide up-to-date information directly to our residents. Council's use of social media is interactive. It allows our residents to comment on the issues that effect them. Council is presently undertaking a series of improvements to our website in order to improve the accessibility and provide the latest information.

In changing the way Council engage the community, six successful Community Days were held. These events were an opportunity to celebrate our diverse communities and get to hear ideas and concerns from our residents. I think all of you will agree these days were a great success.

Each year Council undertakes routine maintenance works conducted on a needs basis. Over the past two years Council has undertaken a major project to renew and improve local park facilities throughout our community. This year Council has undertaken major works at Mascot Park now Lionel Bowen Park, Sir Joseph Banks Park, L'Estrange Park, Grace Campbell Reserve, Mascot Oval, Hughes Avenue Reserve, Garnet Jackson Reserve, Mascot Memorial Park, Arthur Park and Booralee Park.

I remain staunchly opposed to any reduction in services for our community. Council will work with all levels of Government to ensure our community receives the services it needs. I was very disturbed to learn that under the O'Farrell Government Botany and Mascot fire stations no longer operate as full-time stations. The danger of this policy was demonstrated on 11 July 2013 when Botany Fire Station was offline during a major fuel leak at the Caltex terminal. While we are very fortunate that the fuel did not ignite, there was a very real potential for disaster. The City of Botany Bay is located in the middle of some of the most danger prone sites in the Sydney metropolitan region including the airport, freight and shipping ports and chemical facilities. It is reckless and irresponsible to reduce the level of fire and emergency services to our community.

EXTRAORDINARY MAYORAL MINUTE

Meeting 10 September 2014

This morning the NSW State Government finally announced its response to the Independent Review Panel's Report into Local Government Reform.

As Councillors would be aware, the Panel recommended the City of Botany Bay merge with the City of Sydney, Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra Councils.

We always expected that the Government's response would actively support amalgamations – as it was set up to do just that.

In a surprise twist, the report stops short of recommending forced amalgamations, instead providing for a range of inducements for Councils that voluntarily agree to merge.

Apart from missing out on the proffered inducements, it is not clear whether there will be any other consequences for councils that refuse to merge.

The State Government needs to make a clear and unequivocal statement that there be no forced amalgamations during this or the next term of government.

The Government's 'Fit for the Future' package requires councils to show that its:-

- Operating Performance Ratio is greater than or equal to break even over three years;
- Own Source Revenue Ratio is greater than 60% over three years
- Building and Infrastructure Asset Renewal Ratio is greater than one over three years;
- Infrastructure backlog Ratio is less than 2%
- Asset Maintenance Ratio is greater than one.
- Debt Service Ratio is greater than zero and less than 0.2.
- Real Operating Expenditure per capita over time
- Has the scale and capacity consistent with the recommendations of the Independent Panel.

I am confident that the City of Botany Bay will be able to meet these tests of a "fit for the future" council without any mergers. I look forward to demonstrating to the State Government our strength in all these areas. Our Vision 2040 project alone should show we have the strategic capacity to continue as an

independent council. There will be no need for - or benefit to our residents in - the amalgamation our City with any other Council.

It is critical that Council put its best foot forward in this process, but that participation does not detract from day to day service delivery. I will therefore be moving that consulting resources be used to support this task.

This Council does support reform for the local government sector. In fact our system of governance with single Councillor Wards and a popularly elected Mayor ensures this Council operates at a very high level of efficiency and effectiveness. We have continually worked to improve services and outcomes for our local community. We have a long and proud history of looking after our residents by offering services that many other councils no longer offer.

Accordingly, I move that:-

- 1. The Mayor write to the Minister and the Premier seeking clarification that they stand by their no forced amalgamation position for this term and the next term of government.
- 2. The General Manager engages appropriate resources to prepare Council's 'Fit for the Future' response as requested by the State Government and the General Manager be authorised to allocate suitable resources, including funding for Council's response.
- 3. That if the State Government is intent on forcing the City of Botany Bay to amalgamate with any other Council, an immediate community campaign be conducted and the General Manager be authorised to allocate suitable resources, including funding, to undertake such a campaign in consultation with the Council.

I move this minute be received.

1. Final Report of the NSW Independent Local Government Review Panel

I remain committed to keeping our Council Independent.

Last year's resident survey demonstrated the strong support in our community for the City of Botany Bay. A total of 96% of respondents indicated they would like our Council to remain independent. The results of this survey demonstrate that our residents are strongly supportive of the work that we do and support the continued independence of our Council.

Revitalising Local Government

The Final Report of the NSW Independent Local Government Review Panel has now been released. The Report is titled Revitalising Local Government and is dated October 2013 but was not released to the public until 8 January 2014.

It has been clear from the outset of this process that the State Government has pursued a political agenda and the cost of this agenda has been significant.

A total of \$1.8 million, 18 months and four reports with 1,143 pages has been the cost of a process which has revealed little new about local government in this State.

From the title of this Report through to its predetermined conclusions, the flawed methodology underlining this report is clear.

There are some proposals which are worthy of due consideration including a legislative change to require directly elected Mayors, recognition of Local Government in the State Constitution, the requirement for all Councils to have a Chief Financial Officer and Mandatory Professional Development for Councillors and Mayors.

However these potentially worthwhile reforms are given little coverage in comparison to the proposals for boundary change.

Sydney-Botany Amalgamation Proposal

Revitalising Local Government contains a proposal to amalgamate the City of Sydney with the City of Botany Bay. This amalgamation is described as one of "relatively minor adjustments to the city's (Sydney's) current boundaries to enhance the potential for improved urban management". This proposal would see an expanded City of Sydney which includes the suburbs of Newtown and Paddington as well as the City of Botany Bay.

The panel concludes that this proposal "would produce a somewhat strengthened city with a population of around 300,000 in 2031". Once again the panel reveals its preference for Councils with larger populations, without ever establishing a suitable rationale for this position.

The Sydney-Botany merger is proposed as an alternate to the Panel's preferred model the Global Sydney model. The initial proposal for a "Global Sydney Council" is reiterated in the final Report. This proposal would see the City of Botany Bay amalgamate with not only the City of Sydney but Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra Councils.

Council's Financial Position

Revitalising Local Government parrots the incorrect conclusion contained with the Treasury Corporation Report released in April last year that our Council is in a "weak" financial position. This is despite Council's external auditor describing our financial position as "sound" at the end of last Financial Year.

As Councillors are aware, the TCorp Report assessed our Council on the basis of the financial pressures faced by Councils now and into the future. The report assessed the *current* financial sustainability of the City of Botany Bay on the basis of *future* infrastructure expenditure estimates, described by Treasury as the 'infrastructure deficit'. This would be the equivalent of the State Government listed as in deficit of \$14 billion because it is yet to build the North West Rail Link.

This is dodgy accounting by a State Government which has fixed this report to fit with its agenda. The State Government wanted a report to state that Councils throughout NSW are financially unsustainable – so they moved the goal posts to make sure that's what they got.

The panel now proposes that a local government finance facility be established, through an amendment of TCorp legislation. The scope of authority available to this finance facility has not been clearly established. This proposal might mean a hostile State Treasurer gaining authority over the fiscal management of Councils.

Regional Joint Organisation

As an alternative to both the Global Sydney Proposal and the Sydney-Botany merger the panel recommends a "Regional Joint Organisation" comprising the City of Botany Bay and Randwick, Sydney, Waverley and Woollahra Councils.

This Regional Joint Organisation appears to be simply a rebadging of the panel's previous plan for mandatory "County Councils" in metropolitan areas.

The panel writes:

"Many submissions to the Panel have argued that ROC (Regional Organisations of Councils), more or less in their current form should continue to be the primary form of

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regional collaboration in local government, although some have proposed that their membership should become mandatory. The Panel's concern, however, is that the embedded culture of ROCs is one of voluntarism either in membership or participation in joint activities or both."

This statement reveals that the Panel's Regional Joint Organisations represent a "stealth amalgamation" agenda. The Panel writes "there are also legislative impediments to effective shared services arrangements, including the need for each participating Council to separately approve tenders for regional provision of goods and services..."

The Panels changes would give the Regional Joint Organisations the ability to over-rule their constituent Council's on decisions concerning tenders and possibly other areas as well.

Comments by the Mayor of Randwick

In January the Liberal Mayor of Randwick Cr Scott Nash revealed his amalgamation proposal, Cr Nash proposes an amalgamation of the people of Randwick, Woollahra and Waverley Councils and Port Botany but not the residents of the City of Botany Bay. As Councillors and Residents in both Botany and Randwick are well aware the major impact of Port Botany - its associated infrastructure, transport routes and industries – falls on the City of Botany Bay not Randwick. In planning terms Cr Nash's proposal is incoherent. It seems Councillor Nash is only interested in rates, not residents.

The title of the report has changed. The agenda remains the same.

MAYORAL MINUTE NO 7

Meeting 22 October 2014

2. Amalgamations Update

Since our Extraordinary Meeting last month there have been a number of developments in the ongoing issue of amalgamations.

On Monday 20 October 2014 the Premier used his address to the Local Government conference in Coffs Harbour to state his case for amalgamations. The speech saw some of the strongest language we have yet seen from the Government on the issue of Amalgamations. The Premier said "19th Century Boundaries… need to be challenged". The Premier has also encouraged Councils to "put pride into the backseat and move the community into the front seat."

Putting aside the fact that many Council boundaries, including those of the City of Botany Bay, have changed since the 19th Century, the rhetorical purpose of the Premier's speech is clear. The Premier has sought to redefine the issue of amalgamation as an act which is in the community's best interest. This is based on the flawed assumption that amalgamations will necessarily lead to improved outcomes for residents. The Premier also fails to accept that the residents of the City of Botany Bay and many other cities throughout Sydney and NSW remain overwhelmingly **opposed** to amalgamations. The 2013 survey demonstrated that 96% of respondents are opposed to our Council amalgamating with other local councils.

Surveys from throughout Sydney have demonstrated a similar dearth of support for boundary amendments. For example:

- In Canada Bay 85% of residents voted to remain independent.
- In North Sydney 71.4% voted against amalgamation.
- In Randwick 77% of residents voted to remain independent.
- In Woollahra 80% of residents voted to remain independent.

It would appear that the only location where a majority support amalgamation is the Baird Government's Cabinet table. Indeed, given the media and property industry barracking for a "tough" Premier to drive amalgamations, it seems that Pride may well be in the driver's seat of the Baird Government. On 11 September 2014, the day after our Extraordinary General Meeting I wrote to the Premier Mike Baird seeking clarification that the NSW Government stood by its policy of 'no forced amalgamations' for this term and whether they would take that policy to the next election.

I have now received a response from the Premier. While the Premier's letter was intended as a response to my letter of 11 September 2014 it in no way responded to my letter. Instead, the Premier chose to ignore the very real concerns and question I had raised and simply cut and pasted the information from his media release on the Fit for the Future package.

The Premier's obfuscation and silence sends a clear message. The State Government will force amalgamations on the people of NSW even though there will be no real benefit.

I have written to Clover Moore Lord Mayor of Sydney in her capacity as head of the Metropolitan Mayors Association and requested that she convene a meeting. I am advised that a response from Cr Moore will arrive shortly.

1. Fit for the Future

Let me be entirely clear: the City of Botany Bay remains completely and implacably opposed to any amalgamation under any circumstances.

We hold this clear and unequivocal position as a function of both our considered beliefs regarding Local Government administration and the views and preferences of our local community.

We have on many occasions set out the evidence that our City is not only efficient and effective with its resources, but that it is also responsive and caring towards its residents. We have reviewed economic analyses that show more generally that scale effects are nonexistent in local government above a minimum threshold. We know from our own observations that very large Local Government areas in Sydney – such as Liverpool and Blacktown – have not received any greater level of strategic engagement with State Government. We have read the reports and know that the "Independent" Panel's case for change was only made by eliding the difference between the very real challenges of rural and regional local government and the situation in metropolitan Sydney. We are therefore clear that no benefit is to be gained through amalgamation. We are confident that this position retains the strong support of the local community – because we asked them! Prior to the 2013 survey Council clearly stated our position and our community overwhelmingly supported that position!

Our approach has been one of clear communication with our local residents and community consultation. What a contrast to the State Government position!

The State Government's *Fit for the Future* process is a bureaucratized veneer on an ill-considered effort to curry favour with a media organization that has no understanding of local government and no desire to engage with the details and issues at stake.

So the State Government has put cash on the table to assist with this process? Well let me tell you - when State Governments actually offer to throw money at Local Government to do something – you know it's definitely something that the State Government doesn't want to do itself.

Even the name of the policy package belies the lack of confidence the State Government has in its own policy. When a Government chooses to name a policy program with a vague, Orwellian, anthropomorphic title, rather than simply describing what the policy actually does, then there are two possible explanations. Either the Government failed to really think the policy through or the government's knows that the community won't support what it actually wants to do or possibly both of these explanations are true.

This State Government has become addicted to vague language in the area of Local Government policy. We are told not only that we must be "Fit for the Future" but that "no change is not an option". What does this strange, passive voice, double negative even mean? Does it mean they will force amalgamations? No one will tell me – not the Premier, not the Minister for Local Government nor the bureaucrats running the Office of Local Government. But they repeat these non seguitors as though they constitute a mantra that will explain all, if only they are repeated often enough.

Well Councilors, the truth is that this is the mantra of a government that lacks the courage of its convictions.

- If the NSW Government truly believed that the forced amalgamation of local Councils would be popular politics – then they would say what they wanted to do.
- If the NSW Government truly thought there was a strong case to be made on policy grounds – then they would try and make that case.
- And if the NSW Government truly believed that amalgamation would deliver positive results for the communities affected - then they would start by doing it in their own backyard and moving with alacrity to merge Manly Council, Mosman Council, North Sydney Council, Lane Cove Council, Hunters Hill Council, Pittwater Council and Warringah Council. But they won't.

Instead they trot out meaningless phrases.

The agenda here is clear. They don't want to be the ones to force amalgamations – they want other people to do the work for them. That's why they are keeping their language vague – so they can fool the easily frightened into jumping before they think they will be pushed.

And the NSW Government is having some success with this strategy. Some of our neighbouring Councils have passed resolutions and have started to panic. The smell of fear is in the air and it can cause the weak to lose their bearings.

But we should have no such fears.

- Our position is clear and evidence based;
- We know we have the capacity and the resources to stand alone;
- The community support us; and
- The State Government is unwilling to clearly state its policy.

In these circumstances it is clear that we can be confident in standing strong and in standing for our independence.

I therefore move that:

- The Mayor and GM will be clear in all multi-lateral fora such as LGNSW and SMM, and in all bi-lateral discussions with neighbouring Councils, and in any discussions with relevant unions or other associations, that the City of Botany Bay will remain independent and will not participate in any amalgamation proposals.
- Should the position of the State Government change to unequivocal support for forced amalgamations then and only then will the Council reconsider its preferred approach.

2. Amalgamations Update

In recent months some Councils, including those located in South and East Sydney have begun to publically explore 'options' for amalgamation. The position of these Councils is that amalgamation is inevitable and the best option, even for those communities adamantly opposed to amalgamation, is to concede defeat.

I don't understand why anyone would choose to surrender before the battle truly begins. That is what they are doing.

If the State Government truly believes that amalgamations are in the best interest of the local government sector it would make Council mergers a key platform of their upcoming bid for re-election. Rather than building a case based on half-truth and obfuscation, rather than hiding behind buzzword phrases of ensuring Councils are "Fit for the Future" and postponing the ultimate show down until after the March 2015 election, the Liberals should make it clear that a vote for the Baird Government is a vote to overturn 150 years of local government in this State on the bizarre assumption that larger Councils are somehow better than smaller Councils.

Recent history has demonstrated that no Government, no matter the margin of their victory or the popularity of their leader, is immune to public opinion.

That is why this Government has resorted to underhanded tactics in order to minimize the political fallout. The NSW Government's 'Fit for the Future' exercise is an exercise in placing political gain ahead of genuine policy reform. The government has commenced this process with a pre-established agenda which it has sought to implement through political bullying.

In 2013 the City of Botany Bay polled our residents and found that an overwhelming 97% of respondents were opposed to amalgamation. This was an incredible outcome which demonstrates the overwhelming opposition to Council boundary changes in our City. It also demonstrates that I and my fellow Councillors have an obligation to advocate on behalf of our constituents against amalgamation.

The Government has encouraged Councils to undertake consultation with their communities, seeking to steer the conversation in a way that presupposes amalgamation is the only option.

How can the Government expect Councils to undertake meaningful consultation when the Government's intentions are unclear? If the City of Botany Bay undertakes a formal poll which reflects a similar overwhelming opposition to amalgamation will the NSW Government honour the people's wishes?

In the coming weeks Council will distribute further information to local residents about our campaign against amalgamation and asking them to support Council on seeking clear answers from the Liberal Government.

I should note that I am pleased to see opposition to this process emerging in Liberal heartland. It is good that conservative Councils and their communities are showing that there is an alternative. I look forward to working with these Councils to oppose the State Government on their flawed agenda.

MAYORAL MINUTE NO 3

Meeting 22 April 2015

1. **Housing Supply and Local Infrastructure**

The recent report Missing the Mark released by the Property Council of Australia found that the City of Botany Bay is one of the few Councils in Sydney that is meeting and even exceeding its annual target for housing supply as set by the NSW Government.

This report was based on an independent audit of housing provision performance of local councils in the greater Sydney area. Our performance was measured against the housing targets established in the 2005 City of Cities Strategy and the Metropolitan Plan for Sydney 2036. The report graded each council's performance from "A+" for those Councils deemed a "standout performer" through to "D" for those that had "grossly underperformed".

On this grading system the City of Botany Bay was awarded an "A".

Let's be clear about why this is an important achievement. It's important because maintaining growth in our housing supply, with a range of housing types, is one of the most important levers for keeping housing affordable.

I have recently received many letters from residents of the new ParkGrove development. In the course of making representations regarding the Development Application for ParkGrove West, they often comment about having been priced out of buying a torrens title property in the south eastern part of Sydney, how pleased they were to be able to afford to buy a large apartment in a well planned development that promised great amenity for the new residents.

This combination of goals – of increasing supply while delivering great amenity for current and future residents – is what we strive to deliver and what we are proud of delivering. It's why we have some of the strictest development guidelines and controls in NSW and why we take slightly longer to approve developments: because we are committed to getting them right. It's also why we are committed to continuously monitoring and improving our development controls, why we have been fighting for more than a year to delete the bonus clauses, and why we will continue to fight on this matter.

In this context it is also worth noting the recent decision at appeal before the Land and Environment Court in *City of Botany Bay v Botany Bay Developments 2 Pty Ltd*.

Technically, this decision determined the part of the *Residential Flat Design Code* that is relevant for consideration with the clause in the SEPP that refers to the ability of the consent authority to refuse development applications based on unit sizes. In effect, this case confirmed the ability of Council to insist on apartment sizes larger than the bare minimum set out in certain state planning instruments.

This was a great outcome for the City and a great outcome for existing and future residents. Larger apartments mean better internal amenity for residents and lower intense development which benefits neighbours.

And let's be clear we will continue to fight hard to defend our planning controls and ensure good development in our City. This is about achieving quality developments that are in line with our planning controls. We make no apology for strongly defending our planning controls. Indeed in this last year we have spent a substantial amount on planning appeals and currently have five matters before the L&E Court.

This is surely proof, if any were needed, that this Council does not have a development at all costs approach. Rather we follow a careful and considered approach to meeting the State Government supply targets while protecting the amenity of current and future residents.

But let's return to our positive report card from the Property Council.

First – it's the clearest proof that the campaign to merge Councils – as promoted by the Property Council – is ill-conceived and irrelevant to the needs of Sydney. Size is irrelevant.

Second – it should be the basis for a renewed discussion with State Government about our critical infrastructure requirements – in public transport, roads and educational and recreational facilities.

I will be writing this week to our new Planning Minister and asking that he take note of our strong performance in housing delivery and proposing that – if he is serious about improving the supply of housing – then he should encourage his NSW government colleagues to give priority to Council areas that are delivering on their housing supply targets. We should be at the front of the queue for public transport augmentation and road capacity improvements. I have a long list of requests that were not prioritized by the former Transport Minister:

- The extension of the M20 to Banksmeadow shops;
- Increased frequency and reliability for the 309, 310 and X10 bus routes;
- A transport interchange at Mascot Station and shuttle services from Botany and Eastlakes to Mascot station;
- The extension of the light rail through to Eastgardens;
- Extend the 309 Bus Service to Eastgardens;
- Improve bus services for Eastlakes residents;
- Provide additional school special bus services for local primary and secondary school students that attend schools located outside our City; and

I also have a list of priority intersection upgrades to discuss with the Roads Minister.

I will be proposing to Minister Stokes that it would set a very positive example to all councils if these matters were to be addressed as a consequence of our excellent delivery of new housing

Our local residents should be rewarded for their generosity and welcoming attitude to growth. Our City has maintained a sensible approach to housing supply and new development. Local residents recognise the importance of increased housing supply and our community continues to welcome new residents. The State Government should reward this commitment.

2. "Fit for the Future" Community Consultation

Our local residents support the City of Botany Bay and are opposed to any move to amalgamate our Council. I am grateful for the response that Council has received in our consultation with residents regarding this matter.

As Councillors are well aware, in July 2013 the City of Botany Bay conducted a mail in survey of our residents. We achieved an astonishing 27% response rate and found that an overwhelming 97% of respondents were opposed to amalgamation.

In March 2015, Council launched the *Hands off Botany* Bay campaign. A flyer was sent to each household in the City explaining the Government's plans and asking for residents to provide submissions supporting our City's continued independence. So far approximately 1,400 responses have been received as a result of our "Hands off Botany Bay" campaign. These responses have been sent directly to Minister Toole so that he can see, first hand, the strength of community opposition to forced boundary changes.

In order to conform to the NSW Government's process Council is required to undertake further consultation with our residents. To be frank, nothing has changed since the survey was conducted two years ago. But in order to comply with the Fit for the Future process we will this time undertake a random telephone survey of residents. Taking this approach will help show that our survey results two years ago were not skewed by the methodology used at that time. This survey will ask residents to indicate their preference for one of five options:

- 1. Remain independent.
- 2. Merge with Randwick only.
- 3. Merge with Randwick, Waverley, Woollahra and Sydney
- 4. Merge with Sydney only.
- 5. Merge with Rockdale and Marrickville.

Residents will be asked to nominate a minimum of two preferences.

Councillors, I am confident that our residents will again make clear their overwhelming preference for the City of Botany Bay to remain

independent. Let us hope that the State Government will listen to the people.

Let me be clear Councillors that should there be any hint from the State Government that a forced amalgamation process is being considered, then we will act swiftly to order a poll under the Local Government Act. By way of this Minute we will resolve to place Council officers on notice and to authorise expenditure to enable the Council to be ready to conduct this poll with three weeks notice.

1. The City of Botany Bay is "Fit for the Future"

As Councillors are aware Council is required to respond to the Fit for the Future reform program by way of a formal submission to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) by 30 June 2015. IPART has been appointed as the expert panel by the NSW State Government to assess whether councils are 'fit' or 'unfit' in relation to the methodology developed and to provide recommendations to the Minister for Local Government by 16 October 2015.

Our response has consistently and appropriately been that the City of Botany Bay is sustainable. We have sufficient scale and capacity to meet the current and future expectations of our community. We can demonstrate our performance against all of the Fit for the Future financial benchmarks. We have an enviable reputation of capable political and managerial leadership, meeting the challenges of urban renewal and growth and delivering for our community. We enjoy strong community trust and satisfaction.

Councillors let me be clear. Tonight we will adopt a draft Council Improvement Proposal for submission to the IPART. I can advise Councillors that I will personally finalise this prior to the due date of 30 June.

Our submission will demonstrate that we are in fact fit for the future. Our submission will demonstrate that we already have sufficient scale and capacity and we can demonstrate a compelling case to continue as we are.

Despite all the facts being on our side, our submission may not meet the arbitrary scale criteria the Government has set. But that matters little. The outcome of this process is actually meaningless. Councils that are declared "fit for the future" and which resolve to merge will only receive two benefits – funds to support the one-off costs of a merger and access to discounted borrowings. We do not want these benefits, nor do we need them.

As you know there are certain people in Local Government running around saying that the State is holding "a gun to the head" of councils. There is a great

deal of scare mongering about this process. But the documents and the process are clear – this is a process to support voluntary mergers only.

Based on everything published by this government, it cannot be said that forced amalgamation will be a consequence if a council does not volunteer to merge...

...Of course, should the state government try to pull a fast one and suddenly change their tune regarding the consequences of this process, then they would stand condemned for their mendacity. Such an outcome would be a betrayal but it would be a betrayal by the State Government. We will not be the betrayers of our community.

The City of Botany Bay is 'fit' to remain as a stand-alone council now and well into the future. We move forward confidently with this process.

I move this minute and our draft Council Improvement Proposal be adopted.

If councils get bigger they must also get better

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RECENTLY Lucy Turnbull argued for bigger Sydney councils and regional planning bodies, but there was something missing: evidence. Turnbull said bigger councils would be more efficient and strategic. But she offered no data or even anecdotal evidence to support these assertions.

Indeed, if you compare councils across Sydney there is simply no correlation between size and cost effectiveness or delivery of new housing, or any other strategic objective.

Take the example of my City of Botany Bay. We are one of Sydney's smaller councils with only 40,000 residents. But we have low rates, high service levels and no debt. Significantly, we are one of very few councils that has met the metropolitan strategy targets for new dwellings. And we have very satisfied residents.

"Big government" is rarely a better, more efficient solution. So it's strange to see business interests rushing to embrace it in this case. Rather than size, the critical factor that determines efficiency and strategic capability is governance. Councils with stable, clear leadership are invariably better than councils with a revolving door of mayors and general managers.

Similarly, voting systems that deliver stable but contestable majorities also deliver more effective government. In Botany, our single member wards make voting simple and ensure each councillor is directly accountable to their residents - and that no one can be elected by courting a noisy minority. Reformers should be focusing on governance issues such as these if they wish to deliver better results from local government.

Turnbull also makes the broader argument that bigger local governments will empower local government in

relation to the state. But this is true only if the powers and funding of local government are also increased. Nothing like this is even being discussed.

That's why Turnbull's comparison between Sydney and Brisbane is misleading.

The Brisbane City Council is responsible for a much wider range of services and activities, such as public transport. It has the funding and legal authority to deliver these services.

If we simply merge Sydney councils as they are, we will end up with massive bureaucratic organisations dedicated to simple tasks such as maintaining parks, local roads and footpaths. The current mixed performance of large Sydney councils proves this will not be a good outcome.

So Brisbane City Council shows there is a case for reforming local government - that is devolving state government roles to local councils. Looking around the world, it's clear that local government could deliver many state government responsibilities effectively, even at relatively small scale.

Indeed, many services are better when they are delivered and controlled locally. Communities get better results when they are free to innovate and tailor solutions to local needs. Local public servants tend to keep a sharper eye on costs. And politicians are more accountable. We stand ready for a discussion about reform that will actually deliver better services for the people of Sydney. An empty debate about amalgamating councils as they currently are is not the place to start.

Randwick won't rule out merge

BUT DON'T FORCE IT, PREMIER

THE time has come for local government reform, this was the message Randwick Mayor Scott Nash delivered to the Premier on Thursday.

The day after the State Government unveiled its Fit for the Future package, offering a \$258 million carrot for councils to merge, Premier Mike Baird and Local Government Minister Paul Toole met with representatives from the Randwick and Waverley councils.

Cr Nash reiterated the council position of no forced amalgamations but said he was "big supporter" of local government reform.
"I don't think it's prudent to come out and say we are opposed to amalgamation full stop," he said.

An independent report commissioned by Randwick Council in February 2013 found merging with Woollahra and Waverley councils, as well as Port Botany, could create more than \$500 million over 10 years.

The report put forward the merge as an alternative Premier Mike Baird did not rule out forced mergers. "If we get to the end of the process and councils are not fit for the future, we have to consider what options we can work with them. The current position is not sustainable." to the Local Government Review Panel's preferred "global city" that would see Botany, Woollahra, Waverley and Randwick swallowed up by Sydney Council.

Waverley Council has given tentative support for a voluntary merge with Randwick and Woollahra but Botany Council vehemently opposes any $\,$ amalgamation .

Botany Bay Mayor Ben Keneally has condemned the State Government's use of "dodgy figures" to push its council amalgamation agenda.

"The government is using historical data that it knows is incorrect in order to build a case for forced council amalgamations," Mr Keneally said of the claim Botany was in a weak position.

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Super council in sharp focus

MERGER INCENTIVES TO PROMPT DISCUSSION

WILL Randwick Council be tempted by a \$22 million carrot to push for an eastern suburbs super council? Amalgamations are back on the agenda after the State Government announced on September 10 that groups of Sydney councils that merge could receive \$22.5 million.

While Randwick Council has a position of no forced amalgamations, it paid for a report last year which showed a merge of Randwick, Woollahra, Waverley and Botany Bay councils could create a surplus of more than \$500 million over 10 years.

The report was presented to the State Government as an alternative to the 'global city model' – merging the eastern suburbs councils and Botany Bay into City of Sydney – which was recommended by the Independent Local Government Review Panel.

It is understood Randwick and Waverley councils are open to an eastern suburbs council but Woollahra and Botany councils oppose it.

Woollahra Mayor Toni Zeltzer said the Fit for the Future package was not a good fit for residents and read like a forced move to bigger councils.

"The only voluntary aspect of the reform appears to be choosing which neighbouring councils to join up with," she said.

Ms Zeltzer said a merge of Woollahra and City of Sydney could be an option.

Randwick Council will discuss the Fit for Future reforms at tonight's council meeting, and decide whether to start community consultation on what has been announced.

Under the Fit for Future reforms, all councils must submit a proposal by June 30 about how it meets criteria relating to financial sustainability, effective infrastructure and scale and capacity.

"Randwick Council is streets ahead of many local government areas in this process, we've done that work," Randwick Mayor Scott Nash said.

"Fit for Future encourages councils to speak to their neighbours. We should be speaking \dots and sharing ideas on how we should respond to the reforms."

The Fit for Future website states if a council is happy to merge, but its neighbours are not, independent facilitators can help bring the councils together to consider options and take advantage of the incentives.

Botany Mayor Ben Keneally wrote to Premier Mike Baird last week, asking what the next steps were if their residents were against amalgamation.

Waverley Mayor Sally Betts said the council "could and should only support amalgamation if it benefits the community".

"We're looking forward to working with the state government and our neighbouring councils to put a proposal to the community," she said.

Councils call for answers

AMALGAMATION PLAYED DOWN

WHILE the State Government tries to distance itself from forced amalgamation claims by the Treasurer, Randwick and Botany Bay councils are calling for answers.

Premier Mike Baird said on Thursday that Andrew Constance had expressed a personal view, not government policy, when he told a meeting that Sydney should have just five councils and the government might need to "pull out the stick" to make mergers a reality.

Randwick Labor councillor Tony Bowen wants Mr Baird to confirm he is not planning to create five mega Sydney councils with a population of up to one million residents each.

"It seems the government has a vision of mega councils where local democratic representation would be swamped by "local" government bodies half the size of the entire state of South Australia," Cr Bowen said.

Botany Bay Mayor Ben Keneally said Mr Baird used his address to the Local Government conference on October 20 to state his case for amalgamations . "The speech saw some of the strongest language we have yet seen from the government on the issue of amalgamations," Mr Keneally said.

"The Premier said '19thcentury boundaries ... need to be challenged'. The Premier has also encouraged councils to 'put pride into the back seat and move the community to the front seat'."

Mr Keneally said: "The Premier's obfuscation and silence sends a clear message. The State Government will force amalgamations on the people of NSW even though there will be no real benefit".

While standing behind the no forced amalgamations mantra for now, Mr Baird said "councils losing a million dollars a day is unacceptable. It can't go on, there needs to be change".

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Councils may face mergers

AMALGAMATIONS CONSIDERED

RANDWICK and Waverley councils' days are numbered after the NSW Government refused to rule out forced amalgamations , Coogee MP Paul Pearce has warned.



Mr Pearce, responding to Premier Mike Baird's refusal to rule out forced council amalgamations on November 4, said families, small businesses and neighbourhoods would lose their voice in decision making if "monster councils" were created.

"The Liberals and Nationals don't care if local councils are balancing their books and delivering good services to the community – the only think they care about is how big the council is and ripping local councils out of the hands of local communities," he said.

"A local council must have the support of the local community if it is to be successful – riding roughshod over local communities and forcing our council to amalgamate will not deliver better outcomes for the area."

Mr Baird told NSW Parliament on November 4 the financial position of councils was not sustainable, and they should "be bold and grab hold of those opportunities to make sure they are fit for the future".

"Losing a million dollars a day is not sustainable, it needs to be changed," he said.

'No way' to dodge mergers

The panel's preferred merge is a global city of Sydney, Randwick, Woollahra, Waverley, and Botany Bay councils.

THE rate rich landscape of Sydney Airport is casting a long shadow over the Fit for Future merger talks, with a push towards a global city council surrounding the airport and Port Botany.

While at Coogee on a Sundayshe saw the planes flying directly over Coogee as they were making their descent towards Mascot. "I couldn't help but be amazed by their size and energy, all while beach-lovers seemed completely unaware of the huge aircraft that appeared so close you could reach out and touch it."

Rockdale Labor Mayor Shane O'Brien is keen to win the support of Marrickville and Botany Bay councils to propose a merge that inherits all of the airport as part of the council's submission for the State Government's Fit for Future reforms.

Rockdale Council contains the second largest piece of Sydney Airport in its boundaries, Botany Bay has the most and Marrickville has a small slice.

The boundary change could also include south ward of Randwick City to contain all of Port Botany.

"The income generated from the ports and airport – two massive pieces of infrastructure – which have a significant impact on public space, should stay with the councils responsible for that space," Mr O'Brien said.

The Fit for Future package offers councils financial incentives to merge. airport in the proposed Global City council of Sydney, Randwick, Waverley, Woollahra and Botany Bay councils.

Botany Bay Mayor Ben Keneally said the State Government must tell councils what its plan was.

"Will there be forced amalgamations or not? Our residents don't want to be amalgamated," he said.

A spokeswoman for Minister for Local Government Paul Toole said to be sustainable "the system needs to change".

Mr O'Brien said it was important councils discussed mergers with neighbours.

"The Government needs to hear different ideas besides the panel's recommendations and it needs to be a bottom up approach, it can't be from the top down."

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COUNCIL AMALGAMATIONS AGENDA

The state government's Fit for the Future reform agenda, which includes \$258 million in incentives for councils to merge voluntarily, is likely to include forced amalgamations after the March 28 state poll, when it is not burdened by a no forced amalgamations election pledge. Randwick Council is convinced forced mergers will be on the agenda in 2015 and is asking its residents to help shape the future of local government. Information packs detailing seven merger options have been mailed to residents as part of the council's Fit for Future community consultation process. The first in a series of pop-up information stalls will be at Coogee beach on January 17. Randwick Mayor Ted Seng said the council was against forced amalgamations but standing alone was not an option as it did not meet the Fit for Future criteria. Botany Bay Mayor Ben Keneally is refusing to enter into merger talks until forced amalgamations are officially on the state agenda.

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Divergence on mergers

COUNCILS GO THEIR OWN WAY

WHILE Botany Bay Council refuses to discuss boundary changes with neighbouring councils, Randwick Council is consulting the community about preferred amalgamation options.



According to the state government's Fit for Future reforms, Botany and Randwick City Councils do not meet the size and scale to be an efficient council in the future and have been forced to consider amalgamation .

Randwick Council has mailed out seven merge options to residents to consider. Information stalls will be held across the LGA to explain these ideas.

Botany Bay mayor Ben Keneally said he would not entertain the idea of voluntarily amalgamating , and would look at options only if the State Government's "no forced amalgamation" policy changed.

A spokeswoman for the Minister for Local Government said by voluntarily merging, councils would have

Get in or lose out

EXPERT URGES JOINING CITY

AMID speculation the move to bigger councils is inevitable we need more information on the proposed global city council, according to one local government consultant.

Bronwyn Kelly said Randwick Council's Fit for Future information pack, listing seven possible merger options, failed to highlight the positives of merging with Sydney Council.

"Randwick or an eastern beaches block of councils, if permitted in preference to the global city, would eventually end up as the poor relation - a 'have not' potentially surrounded by significantly wealthier 'haves'," the Randwick resident said.

Randwick Mayor Ted Seng said the Independent Review Panel's final report recommended an amalgamation of City of Sydney, Woollahra, Waverley, Randwick and Botany councils - building a "global city" with more than 500,000 residents.

"We don't support the creation of a global city as we value our Randwick identity, local representation and existing quality services," Cr Seng said. NSW councils have until June 30 to show how they are Fit for the Future. The Independent Local Government Review Panel's final report said Sydney councils should be "significantly reduced' from 41 to between 15 and 18. "Sooner or later, amalgamations will have to be part of the package," it said Opposition local government spokeswoman Sophie Cotsis says the true plan behind the facade of "Fit for the Future" is forced council amalgamations Randwick and Botany councils are at odds with the Premier's blended vision, with Randwick looking at its options, including an eastern suburbs super council, and Botany opting not to participate in merger talks

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DEFEND THE REALM

Botany Mayor Ben Keneally and Randwick Mayor Ted Seng have differing views on just how far negotiations for council mergers should go.

THE clock is ticking for Randwick and Botany Bay councils to lead their communities through the politically explosive council amalgamation minefield.



With deadline for the Fit For The Future, the State Government's latest merger push, looming, the two southeast councils are at opposing ends of the amalgamation battle.

According to the Liberal Randwick Mayor Ted Seng, the best way to stave off the threat of a mega City of Sydney, an amalgam of five councils, is to present the State Government with a viable alternative.

But the Labor Botany Bay Mayor Ben Keneally says now is the time to fight to protect the local identity. At last Wednesday's council meeting, Cr Keneally and his new deputy mayor Stan Kondilios vowed to take the fight not only to the State Government but to Randwick and other "defeatist" councils by refusing to hand over non-public information.

It is not just the flow of information but the quality of community engagement that has some, like local



government consultant Bronwyn Kelly, calling for balance. There are calls for more information on the merits of the Local Government Review Panel's preferred option – the global city council – to be made public. Panel chairman Graham Sansom said local government was big business. "NSW councils spend around \$10 billion each year and employ some 50,000 people," he said. "Better local government is vital for the state's future. We can't afford councils that are unsustainable."

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Mayor fights merger

A DEFIANT Botany Bay mayor has snubbed the push to consult on amalgamations and launched a petition to keep the council independent.

ANYBODY thinking the Fit For The Future consultation in Botany Bay was going to deliver a real platform to debate council amalgamations has lucked out.



The Hands Off Botany Bay information pack delivered to residents is defiant from the opening page. Botany Bay Labor Mayor Ben Keneally, who has been a fierce opponent of the State Government's merger push, is unapologetic about his council's decision not to promote the benefits of the global city merger, which would combine Sydney Council with the three eastern suburbs councils and Botany Bay.

The information pack, which has been labelled a form letter, asks for signatures to oppose mergers.

There is no option to give comments or support amalgamation.

Botany Bay Mayor Ben Keneally said the council would not consult residents on Fit for the Future until the State Government "comes clean on its intentions".

In the Hands Off Botany document Mr Keneally says "amalgamation is a bad idea" and he urges residents

to sign the petition to keep Botany Bay independent.
"Sign up. Join the campaign. Keep Botany Bay independent," the brochure says.
Local Government Minister Paul Toole said councils not participating in the process would exclude their communities from the Government's \$1 billion incentive package, including access to low-interest funds to invest in infrastructure.



This year, we have seen 23 councils apply to he Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal to lift rates above the normal cap - simply raising rates is not the answer to creating a sustainable sector," he said.



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Calls for Baird to rule out mergers

WITH the NSW Coalition's election win on Saturday the State Government is no longer pillared by a no forced amalgamations pledge - so does that mean the push for an uber-Sydney council is on?

Premier Mike Baird said Saturday's win meant he had a mandate to push on with his power privatisation plan but Randwick Labor councillor Tony Bowen is calling on him to rule out forced amalgamations .

"It was very telling Mr Baird wouldn't commit to a position before the election, it doesn't reflect well on the government's intentions."

Mr Bowen was one of the Randwick councillors to put his name next to the call for a stand-alone Randwick Council in an email campaign run by community group Kensington Voice ahead of the state

Also supporting a stand alone council were Labor councillors Kathy Neilson, Noel D'Souza and Geoff Stevenson, Greens councillors Murray Matson and Lindsay Shurey and Liberal councillors Harry Stavrinos and Robert Belleli,

The online call came as Sydney Lord Mayor Clover Moore asked Mr Baird to rule out forced mergers. As chairwoman of the Sydney Metropolitan Mayors, Ms Moore was seeking the Premier's commitment on behalf of 26 councils ahead of the election.

"Before the (2011) election the Liberal Party gave a guarantee that it would not go down the expensive, disruptive and anti-democratic path, but up to now the Premier has avoided giving a response," she said.

She said it was unacceptable Mr Baird had refused to answer repeated requests for his position.

The Independent Local Government Review Panel recommended merging City of Sydney, Randwick, Waverley, Woollahra and Botany councils.

When asked about forced amalgamations on Monday, a spokeswoman for the Minister for Local Government Paul Toole said the NSW Government expected all councils to take part in the Fit for the Future program - the Government's response to the panel's final report.

Randwick's analysis report, that examines Fit for the Future merger options will be debated in April. THE Plebs, Pros and Personalities 24hour run for Suicide Prevention Australia (SPA) has returned for a third year with more runners and celebrities and a new location at the Royal Randwick Racecourse.

PPP4SPA has raised more than \$150,000 in two years. Last year 1500 people attended the event and the crowd is expected to double this year.

"It's not about making money, it's about bringing people together and getting the conversation started," organiser Ben Higgs said.

Celebrity supporters are South Sydney Rabbitohs players including captain Greg Inglis, swimmer Michael Klim, model Didier Cohen, the Bondi Rescue Crew and Maroubra chef Colin Fassnidge. Former Wests Tigers player Braith Anasta, who lost his father to suicide at 15, is back on board, as is his wife Jodi. A group of six organisers will run the entire 24 hours.

Community members, athletes and members of Life Cycle Fitness, Vision Personal training and Maritime Union of Australia will also run.

"Sydney is the big event, but the idea is for anyone with a treadmill and enough legs to fill it to host their own events as well," Mr Higgs said.

State remains quiet on council amalgamations

SILENCE from the State Government over the prickly issue of amalgamations has pushed Botany Bay Council to launch a third attempt to harness public support in the battle for their independence.

Between 700-1000 residents will receive a call from an independent survey organisation to ask them their position.

They will be presented with five options – remain independent, merge with Randwick only, amalgamate with Randwick, Waverley, Woollahra and Sydney to create an uber-council, merge with Sydney only or join with Rockdale and Marrickville.

On March 16, council presented 1400 signed flyers from its "Hands Off Botany Bay" campaign to Local Government Minister Paul Toole. It followed a similar mail survey in July 2013.

Randwick councillors didn't waste any time after the state's election last month to call for Premier Mike Baird to rule out forced mergers. The government has given councils until June 30 to put their hands up to merge with their neighbours and has put millions in incentives on the table.

Should they refuse, the government has said it will "consider its options". The government has the power to force councils to merge under existing legislation.





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

Botany Bay Mayor Slams Liberal's Plan for Eastern Suburbs Super Council

Botany Bay Mayor, Ben Keneally, has angrily rejected Liberal Party plans for an Eastern Suburbs super Council that would take over Port Botany from the City of Botany Bay.

"I reject the findings of the study regarding the supposed benefits of amalgamation." The report is a simple desktop exercise driven by a few basic assumptions that aren't supported by reality", said Mayor Keneally.

"The plan to take over Port Botany is a blatant cash grab with no basis in good urban planning.

"The reality is that the overwhelming majority of the freight that comes through the Port travels on roads or rail through the City of Botany Bay. It makes no sense to have planning and regulation of the Port separated from the beginning of the logistics chain. The impacts of port operations are overwhelmingly felt by our residents.

"What this plan effectively says is, 'we'll take the cash from the port but you can keep the truck congestion, the road noise and the rail noise.' That's how they view this part of the world.

"The Liberals are happy enough to take rates from businesses in our area, but the people of Mascot and Botany are not welcome in their snobby Eastern Suburbs Super Council. They think we will lower the tone.

"We'll frankly, to rephrase Grouch Marx, I don't want to join a club that doesn't want me as a member. Our residents are very happy with this Council and want to stay independent."

Mayors team up to reject Local Government 'super Sydney' proposal

Mayors of six council areas which the Independent Local Government Review Panel proposes to group together into a single "super Sydney council area" have put forward a joint submission calling for sensible, practical reform to local government in NSW, not simply mergers for the sake of mergers.

The six councils – Botany Bay, City of Sydney, Leichhardt, Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra presented the submission to Professor Graham Sansom at a recent meeting where he admitted the Panel had not done any cost-benefit analysis of the proposed mergers.

"We share a strong conviction that local government best serves its communities when it is truly "local" in character," the Mayors say in their submission.

"We believe that the proposed super Sydney Council would lose this "local" character and would not deliver any meaningful benefits to the communities we serve.

"We do not believe that the Panel has put forward a compelling, evidence-based case for change and we have no interest in the voluntary merger it proposes.

"We have significant concerns about the proposal, outlined in our joint submission along with alternatives to council amalgamations which include strengthening Regional Organisations of Council.

"Local Councils have a fundamental role to play in the leadership and governance for their area. Local government is not just an administrative outpost of the State Government designed to simply deliver services delegated to it.

"Local Government must have the authority and capacity to identify community needs and aspirations; set strategic priorities, and develop effective plans to implement them.

"Decision-making will become more remote from residents and ratepayers, opportunities for direct contact with political leaders and senior staff will be reduced; and the sense of common interest with fellow residents will be diminished.

"There is no guarantee that amalgamations will deliver benefits and our submission includes worrying information about the effects of the recent creation of Auckland as a super Council. As a result of Council mergers, Auckland could be facing a debt as large as \$12.6 billion by 2021-

2022, and the NZ Auditor General has warned that this debt could be increased further if some of the assumptions the Council has made in its long term plan are incorrect.

"Amalgamations into large local government areas of up to 800,000 residents will inevitably lead to a reduced sense of local control. The Panel's proposal for Local Boards within enlarged councils presents an inevitable dilemma.


"If Boards have little power or responsibility and no resources to take action on behalf of their communities - they will be little more than lip service local representation.

"But giving Local Boards real authority and resources would create a fourth tier of government and an additional layer of bureaucracy.

"We are united in our view that any major reform of local government structures and boundaries should be done democratically.

"There must be a clear process for allowing residents and ratepayers to be heard. These views must be considered and taken into account. The Panel's recommendations include no provision for this.

"We are committed to ensuring our local communities are heard before the proposal for a "super Sydney" council progresses any further," the Mayors say in their joint submission.

The NSW Government has today sought to pave the way for Council amalgamations across Sydney using an outdated and inaccurate report on Councils' finances.


"The Government is using historical data that it knows is incorrect in order to build a case for forced Council amalgamations.

"The claim that the City of Botany Bay's finances are 'weak' could not be further from the truth. A recent 2014 assessment by TCorp upgraded the City of Botany Bay to "moderate", with capacity to meet our financial commitments in the long term.

"The City of Botany Bay remains debt free, with more than \$50 million in investments. Furthermore, our City has kept rates low and has never applied for a rate increase above the rate pegging amount.

"Finally the City of Botany Bay's independent auditor has confirmed that Council's financial position remains 'sound'," Mr Keneally said.

"As an example, the City of Botany Bay cash expense ratio is considered below benchmark yet by TCorp's own admission, as at June 2013, Council held substantial long term investments. If these term deposits were included in this ratio, we would be well above the benchmark for our entire 10 year financial plan.

I write in relation to the Government's response to the Independent Review Panel's report into local government reform released yesterday.

As you are no doubt aware, the 'Fit for the Future' package is silent on the issue of forced amalgamations. I understand the Government is keen to see 'voluntary mergers' but if a Council is in a sustainable financial position and has the support of its residents to remain independent, what position will the Government take?

I understand the Government's position at the last election was that there would be no forced amalgamations of Local Government Areas. Would you please advise as a matter of urgency whether your Government remains committed to this pre-election promise and whether you will take this promise to the next election as well?

It is critical to our residents that we receive a clear and prompt statement of the State Government's position in this matter.

Thank you for your correspondence regarding the Government's announcement of funding support for Councils.

As you are aware the NSW Government recently announced up to \$1billion in funding to support councils to become Fit for the Future and to strengthen communities across NSW.

The Fit for the Future reform package responds to the final recommendations of the Independent Local Government Review Panel and the Local Government Acts Taskforce and reflects the priorities identified by the sector during the past three years of consultation.

The NSW Government has committed a funding and support package to assist councils to make the changes needed to become Fit for the Future. These include:

- \$258 million to assist councils who decide to merge and make the changes needed to provide better services to our communities;
- \$13 million to support Councillors that lead the transition to a new council;
- \$5.3 million for new regional Joint Organisations;
- \$4 million innovation fund to assist small rural councils develop innovative ways of working;
- access to experts to develop a plan and implement change;
- the development of a new streamlined Local Government Act that aims to reduce red tape and regulation and places Integrated Planning and Reporting at the heart of council operations; and
- reviews of the regulatory burden on local government and the rating system.

Councils that become Fit for the Future will have access to a range of further initiatives supporting them to provide improved services and infrastructure to their communities, including:

- access to a State borrowing facility to fund local infrastructure, with potential savings to NSW councils of up to \$600 million in interest payments;
- more flexibility with procurement and simplified reporting;
- access to a streamlined IPART process for setting rates; and
- eligibility for additional planning powers.

Every Council in NSW is being asked to submit a proposal to the NSW Government by 30 June 2015, outlining their plans to become Fit for the Future. The proposals will be assessed by an independent expert panel. Councils will need to demonstrate how they will become and remain sustainable, provide effective and efficient services, and develop the scale and capacity to partner with the State to meet the needs of their communities into the future.

The NSW Government will provide guidance and support to councils to prepare their proposal. Further details about the nature of this support are available from the Office of Local Government.

Thank you for your letter of 11 September 2014 about local government reform and the issue of amalgamations.

The Government has made its position clear in the Fit for the Future package – its focus is on supporting local councils to voluntarily make the changes they need to improve their sustainability and deliver the services their communities need. That is why the NSW Government is investing a record amount to support councils in this endeavour.

The Fit for the Future reform package will help create smarter, modern local councils that can work together with the State to deliver the housing, jobs and transport people need. In metropolitan areas this includes changes to accommodate the forecasted population growth of two million Sydney residents in the next twenty years.

The Independent Local Government Review Panel made a number of recommendations about the scale of existing councils. These recommendations should serve as your starting point for your plans to become Fit for the Future. Even if your council is presently financially sustainable, the issue of scale and capacity will need to be considered by your council as part of your proposal.

I note that you attended a briefing on Fit for the Future in Sydney on 17 September 2014. I trust that the information provided at this event, and in the Fit for the Future templates and guidance released recently, has clarified the NSW Government's position on local government reform. I refer to your letter received by my office on 5 December 2014. I note that this letter was intended as a response to my letter of 11 September 2014 regarding ongoing concerns about the issue of Council amalgamations.

While I note your response, with respect, your correspondence does not answer the questions posed. As such, I have repeated these questions in full in this letter. Firstly, while I understand that the Government is keen to see 'voluntary mergers' but if a Council is in a sustainable financial position and has the support of its residents to remain independent, what position will the government take? Secondly, would you please advise as a matter of urgency whether your Government remains committed to the pre-election promise of no forced amalgamations and whether you will take this promise to the next election as well?

Minister, I put to you that contrary to your claim, the Government has not 'made its position clear' on the issue of Council mergers. While it is apparent that your agenda includes a focus on mergers, there remains deep concern within my community and within the Local Government sector as to whether your Government will break its prior commitment of 'no forced amalgamations'.



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In relation to your letter of 1 December 2014, I request clarification on the definition of "scale and capacity" which you state will need to be considered by Council as part of the proposed *Fit for the Future* Assessment process. I note that the website www.fitforthefuture.nsw.gov.au refers readers to the original recommendations of Revitalising Local Government "for more information". Yet I can find no reference to the issues of "scale and capacity" within the report's recommendations. I note that on page 71 of Revitalising Local Government the report states:

"... increased scale and capacity...will enable councils to remain sustainable, provide adequate services, and be valued partners in the system of government."

However, there is no definition provided within the report or on the website as to what exactly "scale and capacity" means. Minister, I find it very peculiar that it is not adequately defined given your Government considers this to be a core concept of your proposed review process.

Please contact me if I can be of any further assistance to you.

Thank you for your letter of 25 February 2015 to the Minister for Local Government, the Hon Paul Toole MP, in response to your initial letter of 10 December 2015 concerning local government reform in NSW.

As the Government has moved into the caretaker period ahead of the State election on 28 March 2015, convention dictates that Ministerial correspondence be attended to by the relevant agency.

As you would be aware, the NSW Government released Templates 1 (Merger Proposal) and 2 (Improvement Proposal) with associated guidance to councils on 28 November 2014 (available from www.fitforthefuture.nsw.gov.au). The Government is asking all metropolitan councils in NSW to submit one of these proposals by 30 June 2015. I refer you to the guidance material provided with each template for an overview on how to address scale and capacity and the requirements for completing either proposal.

I refer to the letter received on your behalf from Mr Steve Orr Acting Chief Executive, Office of Local Government. I enclose for your reference copies of our prior correspondence including my letters dated 11 September 2014, 10 December 2014, 18 February 2015 and 11 March 2015. Minister, more than six months and four letters later I have yet to receive an answer to my simple question. Once more I ask, will the government seek to force Council mergers or will it stick to its prior commitment of 'no forced amalgamations'?

I find it deeply troubling that neither you nor the Premier sought to resolve this matter prior to the election. The Baird Government had ample opportunity to present a clear plan for the future of the local government sector. If the government truly believed that widespread amalgamation was in the interest of the sector and residents throughout NSW why did they not seek a mandate for any such proposals? Instead, despite the hundreds of pages of policy documents published by the NSW Liberal Party and NSW National Party, there was no local government policy. As such, the Baird Government cannot claim a mandate to make widespread changes to the local government sector prior to the March 2019 election.

In response to my letter of 25 February 2015 Mr Orr advised that because he was writing on 20 March 2015, during the caretaker period of government, the Minister was not able to respond to my correspondence. Minister, this argument is unacceptable in light of the fact I had sent three prior letters in September, December and February without receiving a substantive answer. Indeed this conduct appears to me a deliberate attempt to once again avoid addressing the issue of amalgamations in NSW.



Now that the election is over and you have been reappointed Minister for Local Government, will you end the uncertainty and provide an answer on this simple question: will the NSW Government stick to its prior commitment of 'no forced amalgamations'?
