Message from the Mayor This year especially is a very interesting time in our Nation's history being 100 years since the first year of World War One. It is also interesting to note that there will be many centenary celebrations across Greater Hume Shire in the coming years. The Burrumbuttock community recently held a wonderful celebratory dinner of their Public Hall. The hall has been well loved and cared for by many people over the years and the descendants of those families are still very keen to keep their hall a focus for the Burrumbuttock community into the future, and well done to all involved. Another event of great interest is the 100th year celebration of Australian Red Cross, branches across the shire have held various functions with the Holbrook Branch celebrating 100 years of continuous service, a great effort by many over the years.

Main street upgrades and improvements at Jindera and Holbrook will commence shortly and will create an enhanced street environment, and new street tree plantings have already commenced in other towns. Although it is not guite the swimming season yet. Council has recently completed a structural assessment for all pools in the shire as many are old and in need of upgrades or replacement. Forward maintenance plans are completed. Concept plans are being developed for the buildings and pool at Henty in the first instance. Community representatives and Council staff are considering the plans which will take some months to complete, but it will be necessary for the current pool to serve the community for some time to come. The pools in other towns will undergo a similar consultative process, before any decision is made. Agricultural show time is just around the corner, at Culcairn, Walbundrie and Holbrook, and also at Walbundrie, the Hume Football League footy finals will take place. So, I think it is timely to congratulate all the volunteers who assist in ensuring the recreation grounds are in tip top condition, for all to enjoy. regards Cr Heather Wilton, Mayor

Proposed Special Rate Variation – Commencing 1 July 2015

The formation of Council's annual budget continually shows how difficult it is for Council to adequately fund the ongoing maintenance and replacement of Council's infrastructure assets such as roads, bridges and drainage. As a result Council has formally resolved to apply for a Special Rate Variation, Council has adopted a rate model based on a common theme of a cumulative increase in rate vield of \$317,250 per annum above rate pegging commencing from the 2015/2016 financial year (average of approximately \$50 per rate assessment based on total assessments as at July 2013). The Special Rate Variation would apply for a period of three years being 2015/2016, 2016/2017 and 2017/2018 financial years. As stated, the central aim of the Special Rate Variation is to provide Council with additional resources to commit to the ongoing maintenance and renewal of Council's assets, with the key area being the local road network. That being the case, it is proposed that the additional rate income derived from the Special Rate Variation will be committed to increasing expenditure on sealed road resealing (50% of SRV income) and unsealed rural road gravel resheeting (50% of SRV income). The result of this process will see an additional \$951,750 per annum being allocated to these two key areas of Council's road maintenance program from the 2017/2018 financial year. Council is mindful of the significant impact of rate increases on ratepayers, however Council must ensure that the community's assets do not become unserviceable and a greater burden on future generations. Council will be undertaking a range of consultation programs over the coming months so as to ensure that the community understand and acknowledge the need for, and impact of, the proposed rate increase. Council encourages all ratepayers to participate in the forthcoming discussion process. The following table summarises the additional expenditure for the 2015/2016, 2016/2017 and 2017/2018 financial years.

Swimming Pools

A swimming pool is defined as a structure that is capable of being filled with 300mm of water or more and is used for swimming and other water activities including Concrete or Fibreglass Swimming Pools, Inflatable Swimming Pools, Temporary or Wading Pools, Above Ground Pools and Spas. The Swimming Pools Act 1992 required all swimming pools to be surrounded by a Child- Resistant Barrier. It is the pool owner's responsibility to ensure your swimming pool barrier is in good repair and good working condition.

All swimming pools must be registered on the NSW Government Swimming Pools register. www. swimmingpoolregister.nsw.gov.au/

The owner must ensure that the swimming pool is at all times surrounded by a childresistant barrier as well as keeping the child-resistant barrier maintained by;

- Regularly check Gate operates as intended.
- Regularly check and adjust Latching Device as needed. •
- Regularly check fencing panels for correct gaps, rust and wear and tear.
- Regularly check all fence bolts are tight and in good order.

Spa Pools

A Spa Pool is not required to be surrounded by a child resistant barrier so long as access to the spa pool is restricted as per the Swimming Pools Regulation 2008. Spa pools must be covered and secured by a lockable child-safe structure such as a door, lid, grill or mesh.





Above Ground Pools

The Swimming Pools Regulation 2008

stipulates that for Above Ground Pools, including Inflatable Pools, the walls of the pool shall NOT be considered an effective child-resistant barrier.

CPR Sign

The Swimming Pools Regulation 2008 requires all pool owners to have a CPR Sign situated in a prominent position in the immediate vicinity of the pool. All signs need to be of a size which allows it to be read from a distance of 3 metres.

BPAY NOW AVAILABLE TO PAY RATES

From 1 August 2014 Greater Hume Shire Council rates can now be paid via the BPay option. Simply enter the Biller Code and BPAY reference number as detailed on the front of your rate notice. 



Youth Work Inspiration Day

On Friday 1 August, Greater Hume Shire Council embarked on a new employment initiative titled Work Inspiration Day, in its drive to recruit younger staff into the organisation and the sector. Work inspiration is an Australian-wide, employer-led campaign that transforms work experience into Work Inspiration. This free program provides support and resources to Australian workplaces who want to reinvent their work experience program with young people. This Work Inspiration Day was a collaboration of Council, COMPACT Partnership Brokers and Billabong High School, aimed at showcasing the wide range of employment opportunities that are available at Greater Hume and more broadly in Local Government sector in NSW and throughout Australia. Greater Hume Shire was the first council in the region to pilot such a program with fifteen Billabong High School students participating in the program. The aim of the project was to provide an expose of career options available in the Local Government sector to Year 9 students, encouraging them to undertake work experience in Year 10, and then following on to traineeships once Year 12 is completed. Students enjoyed the rotation through the different departments of Council and particularly enjoyed the real life task of designing a skate park. Students had to design the park, select the location and components and provide ideas as to how it could be funded. The final activity of the day was to map the careers of existing local government employees which included Civil Construction Ganger, Visitor Information Tourist Officer and Director (all current staff at Greater Hume Shire Council). Also Kaye Whitehead, General Manager, Tumbarumba Shire Council attended the event to speak about her role and how she got there. (Ms Whitehead is the 2014 recipient of the NSW Ministers' Awards for Women in Local Government Senior Staff Member – Rural or Regional Council category). All volunteered their career story. including the ups and downs and that in most cases how they modified the journey or took on further study to get to where they are now.

GREATER HUME SHIRE COUNCIL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

Council has allocated \$40,000 in Community Development Funding this financial year. There will be *single round* in 2014/2015 which is now open and applications will be accepted up *until 19 September 2014*. The aims of the grant program are to support, assist and encourage community groups to develop and implement:

- Innovative programs to help build and maintain social cohesion, build local capacity and lead toward social sustainability
- Community and council partnerships
- Enhance, develop or construct community facilities
- Sport and recreation projects and activities

Land clearing and hazard reduction burning outside of the Bush Fire Danger Period

Land-holders are reminded that they must contact the Fire Control Office and their neighbours for any burning that is undertaken on their property at any time of the year. This is a particular reminder for burning during the months from April to October, outside of the Bush Fire Danger period. The Rural Fires Act stipulates that any burning for hazard reduction, land clearance or fire breaks must be notified to the Fire Control Office. All adjoining land holders whether separated by road, stream or fence must also be notified within 24 hours of the burn. As the community is more aware of fires, the public are likely to ring in a fire to 000 if it can be seen, particularly at night. If it is unknown that the fire has been organised, a brigade must be responded to check the situation. This is a large impost to brigade volunteers and their time. Insurance companies are also able to use the lack of notification to the Fire Control office as a loop hole to paying claims if required.

The posts alert road users of the site they need to avoid to prevent further spread of noxious weeds along high risk pathways.

Controlling Queensland Fruit Fly is Everyone's Responsibility!

- STEPS TO CONTROL QUEENSLAND FRUIT FLY
- Winter Prune all fruit trees to a level where all fruit can be reached.
- Summer to Autumn Pick up all unripened fallen fruit and unwanted vegetables, bag and dry in sun before disposing of in the rubbish.



 Spring onwards - Undertake a fruit fly baiting program from August to May each year using a protein bait, which attracts and kills both male and female Queensland Fruit Fly.

NATFLAV 500 is a protein bait that does not attract other insects and does not need to come into contact with the fruit or vegetables. NATFLAV 500 can be purchased at all Greater Hume Shire Council Offices at a cost of \$13.20 for 600 gms.

CHILEAN NEEDLE GRASS

Chilean Needle Grass (Nassella neesiana) is a perennial tussock-forming grass, native to South America. A Weed of National Significance in Australia, Chilean needle grass is a vigorous competitor in agricultural, natural and urban environments. It can severely reduce pasture productivity, contaminate crops and hay, and the needle-like seed can injure stock or pets. Sheep pose a particular problem, as seed burrows into their fleece and skin and cannot be easily removed. Considered one of the worst environmental weeds, Chilean needle grass is highly invasive in native grasslands. It invades urban parks and gardens and is a significant riparian weed along creeks and rivers and is spread by the movement of seed on vehicles, machinery and equipment, particularly along roadsides. Within the Greater Hume Shire Council it is a Class **3 Declared Noxious Weed which must be fully and continuously**

suppressed and destroyed. This noxious weed has been found in Greater Hume Shire, particularly around Culcairn, along the Olympic Way and Taylors Road/Mountain Creek Road area, as well as on Urana Road between Jindera and Burrumbuttock and the Jindera/Walla Walla

Road. Other infestations have been located in the Bungowannah area, the Howlong/Brocklesby Road, the Walbundrie/Rand Road and last year along the Hume Highway near the Westby Road. *For further information please contact the Senior Weeds Officer on 02 6029 8588.*

LIFETIME PROTECTION FOR YOUR PET 'Cheap as Chips' DURING OCTOBER 2014

Residents are invited to microchip their companion animals during October, when a reduced fee of \$20 only will be charged or you can attend our FREE Microchipping Days (see below for more details). To make a booking, you have to pay the fee at one of Council's Offices or Customer Service Centres. Alternatively, the Local Vets are

Under the Companion Animals Act, owners of dogs and cats must:

- Ensure their dog is under effective control,
- Pick up their dog faeces from public areas,
- Address barking problems,
- Microchip their dog or cat by 3 months of age, or before it is sold or given away,
- Lifetime register their cat or dog with the local council before it is 6 months old,
- Ensure their dog wears a collar and identification tag when in a public place,

• Prevent their dog or cat from causing harm to any person or other animal. Council's Rangers will be visiting properties throughout the Shire to update the NSW Companion Animal Register. Failure to register your pet may result in an Infringement Notice being issued for \$275.

LIGHTS ON IN FOG

Greater Hume Shire Council Road Safety Officer, Shelagh Merlin, is urging drivers to turn on their lights and set them to low beam before setting off on their journey, to make their vehicle more visible to others and improve road safety for themselves and their passengers.

"Fog is a major hazard on local roads at this time of year, particularly in the early morning, and it is vital to ensure that you can see where you are going and that your vehicle is visible to others on the road", she said. "If the weather is foggy and your car is fitted with fog lamps, switch them on, but remember to switch them off again as soon as the fog has cleared."

The NSW Road Rules state that you may only use fog lights when driving in fog, mist or other atmospheric conditions that restrict visibility and you must not use any light on your vehicle that may dazzle another road user. In addition to switching on the vehicle's lights, motorists are being urged to slow down when driving in adverse weather conditions such as fog, rain and snow. "Most of our rural roads carry a posted speed limit of 100 km/h, however it is often unsafe to travel at anywhere near that speed, particularly in rain and fog. Slow down to a speed that is safe for the prevailing conditions, increase the braking distance between your vehicle and the vehicle in front and allow extra travel time so that you can focus on the driving task without worrying about the possibility of being late", she concluded.

Road Safety News

Council's Road Safety Action Plan for 2014 – 2017 is now complete and can be viewed on the Greater Hume Shire Council website. This plan outlines the key road safety issues facing our community and the priorities for addressing these.

CENTENARY OF WORLD WAR ONE **Red Cross turns 100**

Red Cross has been woven into the fabric of Australian life for 100 years - whether it's the immediate response to natural disasters, blood service, or everyday work to help vulnerable people. The Red Cross began as the Australian Branch of the British Red Cross Society on 13 August 1914 at Government House, Melbourne, nine days after the outbreak of World War I.Hundreds of thousands of volunteers signed up during WWI, and by WWII Red Cross had become Australia's largest charitable organisation. From a population of seven million, nearly half a million people were Red Cross members, most of them women. In the post-war period Red Cross focussed on social welfare, national emergencies, natural disasters, the blood bank and first aid programs, which were sustained by the extensive branch network and thousands of volunteers. Today one million Red Cross members, volunteers, donors, staff, blood donors, recipients and supporters make a positive difference to the lives of people in need every day.

Locally Greater Hume Shire has Red Cross branches at Burrumbuttock, Culcairn, Henty, Holbrook, Jindera, Walbundrie and Walla Walla, All branches have arranged or will be part of celebration events planned. The Holbrook Branch is the only branch in the region to celebrate 100 years of continuous service. WWI - Touring Exhibition Holbrook, Henty & Culcairn Libraries

World War I (1914 – 1918) helped create our nation's identity. Developed in partnership with the Light Horse Museum, North Bandiana, this object rich exhibition portrays a nation at war, a regional community at war and families at war. The exhibition themes cover a chronological overview

of the war, conditions on the battlefield, life at the home front and the role of women and Indigenous Australians during the war. This touring exhibition includes a tunic worn by Sergeant E R Patino who served with the 13th Field Artillery Battery (Albury Battery); a hat worn by Trooper Alex Borthwick, 8th Light Horse Regiment, in the ill-fated charge at the Nek so graphically depicted in Peter Weir's film "Gallipoli; a diary written by Private Harry Derrick, 37th Infantry Battalion, who was wounded and taken prisoner, dying the day after the Armistice. Also exhibited is an illuminated address presented to Mrs Elizabeth Watson on her return from London, and a program for a performance by concert group, "Billijm's Sisters" who raised money for comforts for Albury boys overseas. Letters from Sergeant Keith McKessar to 'My Dear Wife' before he was killed in 1917, add poignancy to the exhibition. The exhibition artefacts are predominately sourced from the Light Horse Museum and AlburyCity Museum collections. Touring Itinerary

- 11 September 1914 German New Guinea and nearby German-ruled island territories seized by Australian navy.
- November 1914 The First Division of the AIF sailed from Albany, Western Australia, for Egypt.
- 9 November 1914 HMAS Sydney sank the German cruiser, Emden, at the Cocos Islands, Indian Ocean.
- 13 December 1914 Lieutenant Norman Holbrook and crew of the British submarine, B11sank the Turkish battleship, 'Mesudiye', in the Dardanelles Channel. Lieutenant Holbrook was awarded the first submariner Victoria Cross and the French Legion of Honour. The crew of the B11 were also awarded Distinguished Service medals.

SPECIAL RATE VARIATION

Community consultation in relation to Council's proposal to apply for a Special Rate Variation to achieve a better road network is continuing. Over the past ten months, residents have actively participated in this important discussion on the financial sustainability of Greater Hume Shire Council and their expectations for Council services. Residents have taken the opportunity to have their say through randomly selected voluntary telephone surveys, a postal ballot from a publication letter box dropped to all households and meeting Councillors and Council officers face-toface at information sessions held at shopping centres across the shire. Many residents have also commented through social media or made written submissions.

Community feedback, combined with adopted strategies of Council, will assist in the development of a three year Special Rate Variation proposal. Council will notify the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) of its intention to apply for a special rate variation in December 2014. Once the final phase of engagement is concluded, a report will be developed for Council on the outcomes of the consultation process, along with all survey results and submissions received over the past months. Council will make a final decision on whether to proceed



with an application to IPART in February 2015.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM - FIT FOR THE FUTURE

COUNCILS

As advised in previous editions of Community News over the past three years local government in NSW has been subjected to the most extensive review for several decades. In October 2013 The NSW Independent Local Government Review Panel released its final report – Revitalising Local Government containing 65 recommendations to strengthen local government in NSW. These recommendations covered a range of issues to strengthen the sustainability of local government including mergers.

In September of this year the State Government released its response to the final report of the NSW Independent Local Government Review Panel with its 'Fit for the Future' package for local government. The 'Fit for the Future' package includes:

- A Blueprint for the Future of Local Government
- A roadmap for Stronger, Smarter Councils
- The establishment of Joint Organisations for greater intergovernmental collaboration in NSW.

By 30 June 2015 all Councils in NSW will be required to prepare a roadmap to demonstrate that they are 'Fit for the Future' which will include demonstrating that they have the scale and capacity to meet the reasonable expectations of the community, industry and government.

Councils that are unable to demonstrate that they are 'Fit for the Future' will be encouraged to investigate other models such as mergers. Council's proposal for a special rating variation will form a vital part of ensuring that Greater Hume Shire Council is a 'Fit for the Future'. However this is not the only strategy being employed by Council with significant remodelling of the organisation undertaken in the past three years including:

- Review of service levels and methods of service delivery to achieve efficiencies including:-
 - construction and gravel resheeting crews working longer hours during daylight saving period,
 - implementation of the Waste Management Strategy which rationalised the operation of landfills and transfer stations in the shire
 - using volunteers at the Holbrook Visitor Information Centre on weekends,
 - aligning library services with Riverina Regional Library and participating in the winding up of the Upper Murray Regional Library,
- Better utilisation of debt financing to ensure capital projects can be undertaken in a timely manner. Council has recently been successful in obtaining a loan subsidy through the NSW State Government to widen and reconstruct 10.7kkm of Alma Park Road.
- Withdrawal from residential aged care and sale of assets to the 'not for profit' sector.
- Withdrawal from being provider of aged and community services.

Council's role in the future will be one of facilitation to ensure the continuation of an appropriate level of aged and community services throughout the shire.

- The removal of a number of administrative/office based positions.
- Equivalent full time positions being reduced from 149 in June 2011 to the current level of 115.

The State Government has announced a number of incentives to kick start the reform process including:

- \$258m to have councils who have decided to merge to make the transition and provide services and facilities communities need.
- \$13m to support local transition committees and ensure elected representatives are involved in the process.
- \$5.3m to get new regional Joint Organisations up and running.
- \$4m to help small Councils (<10,000 population) develop innovative ways of working.
- Up to \$600m potential savings from cheaper finance for 'Fit for the Future' councils to invest in local infrastructure.

Council is steadfast in the view that Greater Hume ratepayers and the communities they support are best served by being part of a rural based Council. However prior to finalising our 'Fit for the Future' submission to NSW State Government, Greater Hume Shire Council will undertake significant community consultation with its constituents to ensure that Council is on the right track in seeking to remain a rural based Council".

BETTER TELEVISION RECEPTION - Greater Hume Shire Council has been advised by the Federal Government that viewers who live in regional areas and are unable to receive adequate terrestrial television reception from the transmitters that serve the area in which they live, are able to receive their digital television service through the government-funded Viewer Access Satellite Television (VAST) service. To determine their eligibility to receive commercial television services throught VAST, householders should go to the *mySwitch facility online at http://myswitch. digitalready.gov.au/ and enter their address.* If your terrestrial coverage is inadequete, then go to mySwitch for access to services on VAST.



GREATER HUME SHIRE COUNCIL Annual Report 2013-2014

It is an honour to again report on the activities of Greater Hume Shire Council over the past twelve months on behalf of the our Council team. The year has been characterised by a number of major accomplishments while, at the same time, responding to the most extensive review of local government for several decades. A snapshot of the major accomplishments of the last twelve months include:

- Record spending on regional and local roads right across the shire.
- Completion of \$2.8 million of contract works on behalf of Roads and Maritimes Services.
- Continuation of the Streetscape Improvement Program.
- Investigation and establishment of shared service opportunities with neighbouring councils.
- Completion of the Henty Library extension and refurbishment.
- Upgrades in park and sportsgrounds across the shire including Woomargama, Brocklesby, Holbrook and Culcairn.
- Completion of structural assessments at all Council swimming pools.
- In house assessment of the Gerogery Organic Composting Facility that has stood up to the scrutiny of the Joint Regional Planning Panel and the NSW Land and Environment Court.

In addition to the accomplishments listed above, Council has also completed a number of strategic planning documents in relation to land use planning, flood studies, asset management planning, waste management, roads, tourism and economic development, aged and community care, medical services and children's services. Council has continued to reform and streamline its operations in recent years including:

- Withdrawn from being provider of aged and community services. Council's
 role in the future will be one of facilitation to ensure the continuation of an
 appropriate level of aged and community services throughout the shire.
- Removed a number of administrative/office based positions.
- Reviewed service levels and methods of service delivery to achieve efficiencies including:-
 - construction and gravel resheeting crews working longer hours during daylight saving period,

- 2 December 1914 First Australian military aircraft despatched to war Australian aircraft and their crews left to form the 'Mesopotamian Half Flight', fighting in what is now Iraq. Many were captured at the fall of Kut in 1916.
- 3 December 1914 First AIF disembarked in Egypt. Though many had expected to go to Britain, after Turkey's entry into the war the first Australian troops were sent to Egypt to protect the vital Suez Canal.
- 31 December 1914 The second convoy of the first AIF departs Albany. Volunteers for the AIF enlisted so readily that a second convoy left within two months of the first. Many of those on board landed on Gallipoli on 25 April 1915.

- implementation of the Waste Management Strategy to better manager landfills and transfer stations
- use of volunteers at the Holbrook Visitor Information Centre on weekends,
- winding up Upper Murray Regional Library and aligning Council with the Riverina Regional Library.
- Better utilisation of debt financing to ensure capital projects can be undertaken in a timely manner.

The completion of Council's 2013/2014 Annual Financial Statements indicates that Council's short to medium term liquidity position remains strong and will continue to enable the organisation to respond to unexpected occurrences in the short to medium term. As reported last year, the long term view is not as optimistic; the NSW Treasury Corporation describing Council's financial position as moderate with a negative outlook. This means that Council's ability to maintain and improve its infrastructure, particularly the road network, will be compromised if strategies are not identified to address this issue. Your Council team has been implementing changes right across the organisation, however it is clear to adequately maintain our extensive infrastructure, particularly the road network Council needs to increase its revenue and will be seeking approval to implement a special rate variation. Council understands that rate increases of any kind are never welcomed, however we believe a sustainable and affordable increase in rates is essential if Council is to meet the needs and expectations of the community across a range of services. In relation to the review of Local Government. Council remains steadfast in its view that residents of our towns and villages and surrounding rural areas are best served by a rural focussed council and has resolved to seek the retention of Greater Hume Shire Council in its current form. The balance of this four year term concluding in September 2016 will be exciting but challenging, as we chart a new and sustainable direction for Greater Hume Shire and its residents thus ensuring that our shire is 'simply greater'.

Finally, I extend my sincere appreciation and thanks to my fellow Councillors, all staff and our countless volunteers that have all worked towards a common goal - to make our communities more liveable. Mayor, Cr Heather Wilton

BLACKBERRY (*Rubus fruticosus agg. species*)

Blackberry was declared a Weed of National Significance (WoNS) in 1999 and infests about 9 million hectares of land in Australia. Mostly restricted to areas with temperate climates



(warm summers, cool winters annual rainfall of at least 700 mm) plants can also grow in lower rainfall areas under favourable environmental conditions. Being a vigorous plant the negative impacts include:

- reduced grazing land and restrict livestock access to water.
- reduced productivity of land shading out of pastures/crops and competition for soil moisture and nutrients.
- problems in forestry eg prevention of regeneration, reduced capacity of plantation seedlings and hinder access to forests
- degradation of natural environments, displacing native plants and reducing habitat for native animals
- devaluation of visual/recreational aspects of public land, parks and reserves
- harbour for vermin, eg rabbits
- · food for exotic animals eg starlings, blackbirds and foxes.
- fire hazard from dead blackberry material
- obstruction of access to fire trails and water for controlling fires.

SWEET BRIAR (Rosa rubiginosa)

Sweet briar is a native of Europe. The fruit or hips are rich in vitamin C and have been used in making syrups. The worst infestations are usually found on the tablelands and cooler slopes. Sweet briar reduces the carrying capacity of land, harbour rabbits, restrict vehicle access and restrict stock movements, especially where it occurs in clumps or patches. Invading unimproved grasslands and disturbed bushland, prefering well-drained areas of moderate fertility with little competition and light grazing. The weed grows in most soil types. Infestations are often heaviest in hilly and rocky country around trees on creek banks and along fence lines.

ST JOHN'S WORT (Hypericum perforatum)

St John's wort was brought to Australia in 1875 as a garden plant, now found in pastures, water catchment reserves, forests and national parks. St John's wort contains the toxin hypericin, which causes photosensitisation in sheep, cattle, horses and goats. The skin damage

associated with this problem leads to weight loss, reduced productivity and, in extreme cases, death. St John's wort also adds vegetable fault to wool. St John's wort competes with useful plants in pastures, and large infestations reduce property values. It is most suited to areas receiving more than 600 mm annual rainfall and above 500 m altitude.



Legislation - Blackberry, Sweet briar and St John's wort are declared Class 4 noxious weeds under the NSW Noxious Weeds Act 1993. Class 4 control requirements are that 'the growth of the plant must be managed in a manner that reduces its numbers spread and incidence and continuously inhibits its reproduction'. The responsibility for control of noxious weeds on private land rests with the landowner or occupier of the land. Failure to do so could result in the local control authority issuing a weed control notice, court action and a fine.

BUSHFIRE DANGER PERIOD COMMENCES 1 NOVEMBER *The Bushfire Danger Period for the Southern Border Team*

commenced on Saturday, 1 November 2014. This area includes the shires of Albury, Berrigan, Corowa and Greater Hume. Contact the RFS Office in Corowa 02 6033 4550 or Albury 02 6051 1511, for more details. Watch for days of Total Fire Bans as no fires are permitted on these days.

The grass is now curing or drying out, the landscape is becoming more susceptible to fire. Grass fires can be especially dangerous because they start quickly and spread rapidly, destroying not only homes and stock, but also lives and livelihoods. Farmers can help *protect their properties by establishing firebreaks around paddocks, homes and other valuable assets like sheds and equipment.* Firebreaks can assist in slowing a fire's spread and also help stop a fire from entering or leaving your property. People living in areas where there is grass growth should also have a plan for what they will do if there is a fire. Bush Fire Survival Plans are available from the NSW RFS website or from the Southern Border Team Fire Control Centre at 25 Airport Drive, Albury. These can assist in making decisions which can protect you, your home and your family.

Motorists also need to be aware that stopping in long grass can also start fires. Heat from the vehicle exhaust can easily ignite grass under the vehicle. *Motorbikes* without adequate exhaust systems can also easily start fires in long grass, ensure these are in good working order. It is important that everyone understands the risks of grass fires across the Southern Border Team area this season. *Preparation is the key to increasing your level of safety.* Everyone has a part to play, whether you farm, live in town or have a lifestyle block. Everyone needs to take responsibility for themselves, their family and their property.

Prepare, Act, Survive.

TRAVELLING IN A BUSH FIRE AREA

If you're travelling during the bush fire season, you could be affected by a fire. Bush and grass fires often cross roads and highways. Smoke can reduce visibility and roads may also be closed without warning. Make sure you have all the information you will need to keep safe.

Check before you go:

- Fire Danger Ratings and Bush Fire Alerts at or on the Fires Near Me smartphone application
- Weather conditions on the Bureau of Meteorology website.
- How you can call for help
- Emergency Survival kit is packed, including a working battery operated radio, protective clothing, woollen blankets and water.
- If caravanning or camping read our Caravan and Camping Bush Fire Safety fact sheet or brochure
- If bushwalking read our Bush Fire Safety for Bushwalkers fact sheet or brochure

If you are caught in a fire:

Call Triple Zero 000

- Park off the road in a clear area away from trees, scrub and tall grass
- Face the front of your car towards the fire
 - Stay in the car below the windows to protect yourself from radiant heat
 - Turn off the engine and turn on headlights and hazard lights
 - Close windows and air vents
 - Cover yourself with a woollen blanket
 - Drink plenty of water
 - Cover your mouth with a damp cloth
 - Stay down until the sound of the fire has passed, carefully leave the car (it will be hot)





SAFE HOLIDAY DRIVING

Christmas is fast approaching so it is time to prepare your vehicle for those long holiday journeys and start thinking about how you will get safely to and from your holiday destination. If you're going to be driving for more than two hours plan a rest break where you can get out of the car, stretch your legs and maybe have something to eat or drink. The NSW Centre for Road Safety has some great tips for staying safe by not driving tired - check their website at http://roadsafety.transport.nsw.gov.au/ stayingsafe/fatigue/index.html. If you're planning Christmas or New Year celebrations remember to have a Plan B for how you're going to get home after the event. Ideas to consider include arranging a lift with somebody who has not been drinking or using drugs, staying at a friend's house, or walking home. Finally, remember that double demerit points will be in force from Wednesday 24 December until Sunday 4 January inclusive, so slow down, drive to the conditions, arrive alive and have a safe holiday!

WORKS PROGRAM FOR SUMMER

- Alma Park Road widening and reconstruction is due to commence early March, the project will start from the Lockhart Boundary end with works anticipated to last 3-4 months.
- The continuation of 1km road works on Henty Cookardinia Road is also due to commence early March.
- Young Street, Holbrook construction will commence early next year, this project will include road works, kerb and gutter and drainage works.
- A section of roadway on Tunnel Road, south of Ferndale Road will be reconstructed to widen the road pavement . A part of Ferndale Road will also be done in conjunction with this project. Tunnel Road will be widened over culverts that had been extended previously.
- Replacement of kerb and guttering and road rehabilitation at the western end of Elizabeth Street, Culcairn will commence shortly.
- The temporary roundabouts in Jindera have aided in traffic flow through the town centre. Thanks to the Jindera Community for their patience and support during the construction period.
- Modifications to the entrance of Ten Mile Creek Park have been undertaken to restrict vehicle access and to ensure the safety of patrons at the park. This also enhances the appearance and compliments the new play area and BBQ. Kerb and guttering works are still yet to be completed.

NSW BIKE WEEK A SUCCESS IN SHIRE

Students at Walla Walla Public School embraced NSW Bike Week, going all out to decorate their bicycles and helmets before enjoying a morning of fun and cycling, and prizes donated by The Full Cycle were well received. The morning started off with a short safety talk from Greater Hume Shire Council Road Safety Officer Shelagh Merlin, who explained how to correctly fit a bicycle helmet for maximum safety. A highlight of the morning

was a competition to see which student could ride the length of the school cricket pitch the slowest without falling off.



SHARE THE ROAD

With the grain harvest in full swing, motorists driving on country roads are reminded to slow down and watch out for farm machinery, animals and birds on the roads. "At this time of year there is an increase in the number of tractors on the road, many of them towing farm implements, and there are also grain bins and combine harvesters on the move. These vehicles can be slow moving, may be oversized and often take up more than a lane width, particularly on the narrower country roads, and they are nowhere near as manoeuvrable as a car. "The safest measure to take is to slow down, pull off the road if you can and be prepared to stop while the vehicle drives past you", said Greater Hume Shire Council Road Safety Officer Shelagh Merlin. While grain is being transported to silo it occasionally spills on the road, providing a feast for local birds, who can become drunk on the grain if it starts to ferment. "You will often find large flocks of birds eating spilled grain on the road and when they are drunk, they don't always react to an approaching vehicle as fast as they might otherwise. "Scan the road well ahead of your vehicle as you drive, reduce your speed and toot your horn to give the birds plenty of time to fly out of your way", Mrs Merlin concluded.

Payment for lost and damaged items or other charges such as reservations must be paid with cash. To be in the spirit of this program we recommend that food donated should roughly equate to the amount of overdue fines due. *The Food for Fines initiative will run from Monday 10 November to Saturday 13 December 2014 at Culcairn, Henty and Holbrook Libraries.*
