

Introduction

We have been asked to investigate and report on the efficient costs of providing OOHC to children in NSW. We have also been asked to make recommendations on the pricing of different OOHC services, including the care allowance.





What the Interim Report covers

Our Interim Report primarily focused on the current costs of OOHC to government and non-government providers, as well as the lived experiences of carers. We have made preliminary findings on:





The costs of foster care for DCJ and non-government providers



Preliminary findings on price structure



DCJ has limited visibility of the services delivered by non-government providers.

This makes it hard to compare the cost effectiveness of different delivery approaches.



There is a lack of clarity around what services are covered by each package and what additional services non-government providers can request top-up funding for.


Preliminary findings on pricing levels

We heard that:

- funding for individual packages in the Permanency Support Program do not reflect the costs incurred by nongovernment providers in delivering OOHC
- funding for the care of Aboriginal children by ACCOs, and their transfer to ACCO delivered care, is not transparent and does not reflect the actual costs.

Average actual caseload of 17



Non-government providers care for a larger portion of children with higher needs.

Preliminary findings on caring and the care allowance



The care allowance is out of date and needs to be reviewed



There is a need for clearer guidance and support for carers

Efficient costs and quality



Defining efficient costs for OOHC is complex




Many factors impact efficient costs
