#### Learn More

Council's financial sustainability has been an ongoing concern since 2020. In 2022, in an effort to become financially sustainable, council successfully applied for a permanent 35.9% special rate variation (SRV) which came into effect over the 2022/23 and 2023/24 financial years.

Cost to Council pressures to date have further been exacerbated by the high inflation environment and an increasingly competitive employment market that has occurred post-COVID-19, as well as cost shifting from previously State Government funded services that are now at Council's cost (like the recently announced increase to the Emergency Service Levy), a continuation of rate pegging, and the normal increased service level expectations.

The findings of Professor Joseph Drew in the detailed financial analysis undertaken as part of the de-amalgamation business case review also identified the serious current underlying financial challenges faced by Council.

As a result, internal productivity savings and the 2022 SRV has unfortunately not been sufficient to achieve Council's financial sustainability, so we are exploring opportunities to implement a new permanent SRV as part of a range of initiatives to make sure services can be delivered into the future.

Council's funds are broken into three (3) main areas - General, water and sewer. General fund refers to all council activities except for water and sewer services.

At present, Council's water and sewer funds are covering their respective costs. However, the General fund is experiencing a significant deficit which is projected to continue over the next 10 years.

Current modeling in Council's 2023-2033 Long Term Financial Plan (LTFP) shows that further rate increases are needed to enable Council to maintain current service levels, adequately fund ongoing asset maintenance, reduce Council's reliance on external grant funding for asset renewals, and ensure Council's financial sustainability.

Council's LTFP includes three scenarios, all based on existing service delivery levels and maintaining our growing Capital base.

The assumptions made by implementing an SRV for the general fund have been developed with the primary aim of achieving a balanced operating position.

- Scenario 1 (base case) shows Council's expected financial position with reliance just on the rate cap would be a continued deficit in excess of \$4 million in its General Fund each year (before Capital grants and contributions). This scenario is not sustainable.
- Scenario 2 introduces permanent 18% SRV increases over two consecutive years 2024/25 and 2025/26 (39.24% cumulated) which would show a return to a balanced operating budget (before hoped for grants and capital contributions) from year 2025/26 and an overall balanced budget with a slow increase in a small (<2%) surplus over the 10 year period to service any further cost shifting or unexpected new service deliveries as was the case during Covid.</li>

#### NEW ACCOMMODATION OPENED



The new Itinerant Worker Accommodation at the Batlow Caravan Park was officially opened on Wednesday 4 October.

Wagga MP Dr Joe McGirr MP joined Mayor Ian Chaffey, Councillors and community members for the official ceremony.

Dr McGirr said that the opening was another chapter in Batlow's recovery from the 2019-20 bushfires.

The project was jointly funded by the Australian and NSW Government's and has provided an additional 60 permanent beds to support the local horticultural and forestry industries.



#### **TOOMA ROAD WORKS**

Road repair works are underway on a 1.4km section of Tooma Rd near the Paddys River Falls Rd intersection. The works involve 100mm of gravel overlay which will then be sealed with two coat seal.

This project is funded under the NSW Government's



Regional and Local Road Repair Program (RLRRP) and will be completed in 3-4 weels subject to favourable weather conditions.

#### **COUNCILLOR COLUMN – MAYOR IAN CHAFFEY**

I urge all residents to start preparing your homes and properties ahead of the start of this year's bushfire season.

We are entering an El Nino weather phase which brings hot and dry conditions and below-average rainfall and we have already seen bushfires on the NSW south coast and Hunter regions so we can't be complacent thinking it won't happen to us again.

It is vital that we listen to the advice from the NSW Rural Fire Service and our own local Brigades to act now and develop our bushfire survival plans and clean up our houses and properties.

This includes things like clearing gutters, keeping grass short, and cleaning up fallen leaves, twigs, and branches from around our yards and paddocks.

We need to ensure we have cleared around our homes including things like moving the firewood stacked on the front veranda away from any buildings. The last thing we want is to leave more fire fuel lying around.

The RFS also recommends that residents:

- Develop a bushfire survival plan and talk about it with family/friends
- Use the NSW bushfire household assessment tool to know your fire risk
- Be aware of the new fire danger ratings and how to use them as a trigger for action
- Know where your local Neighbourhood Safer Places are located, should you need to seek shelter
- Create a watch zone on the Hazards Near Me app to be notified of any fires in your area

It's not only up to the RFS to keep us safe, as residents we have a responsibility to ensure our own safety and preparedness too.

#### Council Begins Community Engagement on Special Rate Variation Proposal

Snowy Valleys Council has announced a series of community pop-up dates to discuss the long-term financial sustainability of the organisation, which involves options for a Special Rate Variation.

Interim General Manager Steven Pinnuck said Council is investigating applying for a Special Rate Variation (SRV) to achieve financial sustainability.

"Unfortunately, the SRV approved in 2022 has not been sufficient to achieve Council's financial sustainability so we are exploring opportunities to implement a new SRV to make sure services can be delivered into the future," Mr Pinnuck explained.

"Council's cost pressures have been exacerbated by the high inflation environment and an increasingly competitive employment market that has occurred post-COVID-19, as well as cost shifting from previously State Government funded services that are now at Council's cost (like the recently announced increase to the Emergency Service Levy), a continuation of rate pegging, and the normal increased service level expectations.

"Current modeling in Council's 2023-2033 Long Term Financial Plan shows that further rate increases are needed to enable Council to maintain current service levels, adequately fund ongoing asset maintenance, reduce Council's reliance on external grant funding for asset renewals, and ensure Council's financial sustainability."

There are two permanent SRV options explored in the Long Term Financial Plan, option one would see 18% increases over two consecutive years (39.24% cumulative) while option two would see 12.5% increases over three consecutive years (42.38% cumulated).

Mr Pinnuck said both SRV options result in a balanced budget which will allow Council to increase its asset replacement reserves ensuring current expected services can be delivered into the future.

"In the long-term it allows Council to invest responsibly in infrastructure and avoids burdening future generations with excessive costs or excessive reductions to services," he said. Community members can learn more about the council's sustainability measures and the two SRV options at Community Pop-ups happening around the region in late October.

#### COUNCIL IS INVESTIGATING A PERMANENT SPECIAL RATE VARIATION (SRV) TO ACHIEVE FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY.

The SRV approved in 2022 has unfortunately not been sufficient to achieve Council's financial sustainability so we are exploring opportunities to implement a new SRV to make sure services can be delivered into the future.

Council's cost pressures have been exacerbated by the high inflation environment and an increasingly competitive employment market that has occurred post-COVID-19, as well as cost shifting from previously State Government funded services that are now at Council's cost (like the recently announced increase to the Emergency Service Levy), a continuation of rate pegging, and the normal increased service level expectations.

Current modelling in Council's 2023-2033 Long Term Financial Plan shows that further rate increases are needed to enable Council to maintain current service levels, adequately fund ongoing asset maintenance, reduce Council's reliance on external grant funding for asset renewals, and ensure Council's financial sustainability.

#### SRV OPTIONS FOR CONSIDERATION

#### Option 1

18% permanent SRV increases over two
(2) consecutive years 2024/25 and
2025/26. (39.24% cumulated)

This option would show a return to a balanced operating budget\* from year 2025/26.

#### Option 2

 12.5% permanent SRV increases over three (3) consecutive years 2024/25, 2025/26 and 2026/27. (42.38% cumulated)

This option would show a return to a balanced operating budget\* from year 2026/27.

These SRV scenarios result in a balanced budget which allows Council to increase its asset replacement reserves ensuring current expected services can be delivered into the future. In the long-term it allows Council to invest responsibly in infrastructure and avoids burdening future generations with excessive costs or excessive reductions to services.

#### BRINDABELLA ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

The 10km stretch of Brindabella Rd between the Goodradigbee River and Piccadilly Circus (ACT border) is now wider and safer than ever.

Work has focused on improving safety for users by widening the road and improving steep edges and road shoulders.

In places, the road has been widened by up to four metres and the excavated material has been used to form safety barriers to prevent steep drop-offs.

The full project is on track to be finished by the end of the year with final road resealing works planned for December.

These \$3,000,000 safety improvements were funded by the NSW Government's Fixing Local Roads Fund.

I also accompanied Keld Moseholm's family and other artists to the announcement of Snowy Hydro's funding of the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail and Education program at Adelong.

More good news for locals with the reopening of the Adelong Swinging Bridge after several years, thanks to John D'Allesandro and Fiona Matthews who have worked so hard to make this a reality.

To continue to deliver the current expected and necessary services and achieve financial sustainability, Council is exploring opportunities to implement a new Special Rate Variation (SRV) to make sure services can be delivered into the future. Like other businesses, Council is subject to everyday cost increases in areas such as electricity, construction, building maintenance and mandatory staff wage increases. Added to these rising costs is the continued state government cost-shifting plus other expenses outside Council's control thanks to the current high inflation environment.

Previous budget forecasts could not fully predict these changes, so in order to absorb some of the impact of these extra financial strains from the public, Council has already commenced reviewing the structure of the organisation including staffing levels and the manner in which services are delivered.

Council is investigating two SRV options, Option One would see 18% increases over two consecutive years (39.24% cumulative) while Option Two would see 12.5% increases over three consecutive years (42.38% cumulated).



Diminishing Internal Reserves and Unrestricted cash of approximately \$2M to \$3M per year.



#### Background – What was said prior to initial SRV

Previous SRV of 35.95% implemented over the 2022/2023 and 2023/2024 financial years.

> There was strong opposition to both the SRV and/or service cuts.

In addition to the SRV, Council committed to generate savings which has been difficult to achieve in a post COVID environment. A Financial Sustainability Plan was developed and implemented.



(Since 2020 Council has made savings in the order \$1.3M, however most of these savings have been offset by a higher cost environment.)

#### **Background – What was said prior to initial SRV**

- Maintain service levels as close as possible to current levels
- Fund ongoing maintenance
- Fund renewal of infrastructure assets
- Increase capacity to renew deteriorating assets
- Ensure and improve financial sustainability
- Reduce reliance on external grant funding for asset renewals.



#### **Challenges faced by Snowy Valleys Council**

- Tumut and Tumbarumba Councils merged on 12 May 2016 to form Snowy Valleys Council
- Black Summer bushfires late 2019/early 2020
- Significant impacts of COVID pandemic throughout most of 2020 and 2021



At least 6 other natural disaster events since 2021.

Approximately \$128M additional funding in less than 8 years whilst at the same time implementing the amalgamation and ensuring 'business as usual' activities were delivered.

# Why is Council Considering Another SRV?

- Operating in a high inflationary environment
- An increasingly competitive employment market that has occurred post-COVID-19
- Continuation of cost-shifting from the State Government (e.g. substantial increases in the Emergency Services Levy)
- Ensuring Council has the capacity to maintain and replace its expanding asset base funded from rates and other untied revenue.

- Parks and Reserves

Community services (Children's Services, Community Transport and Care Packages etc.) are funded by grants and user contributions.

Water, Sewerage and Waste are funded by specific charges that must be used for the purchase for which they are raised.

# How are we going to Repair the Budget?

Special Rating Variation (SRV)

X

- Opportunities to increase income streams (e.g. Calling for Expressions of Interest for the management/lease of four caravan parks owned by SVC).
- Reducing Council's expenditure including employee costs (this financial year changes have been made to the staffing structure that will remove approximately \$500k from employee costs);
- A review of how services are provided (e.g. a recent change of Council IT Managed Service Provider will see a reduction of approximately \$200K pa);
- Realisation of surplus assets (including real estate) held for sale;
- Review and potential disposal of underutilized assets.

# How are we going to Repair the Budget?

Success of the proposed Special Rating Variation (SRV) Application is crucial as a first step to financial sustainability of SVC.

If successful, and if Option 3 (12.5% pa spread over 3 consecutive years) was implemented rate income would increase by:

2024/2025 **\$1.362M** 

- 2025/2026 **\$2.846M**
- 2026/2027 **\$4.541M**

2027/2028 **\$4.541M** then annually and subject to rate peg increases

Ideally Council will need to identify opportunities to increase income and expenditure savings similar to the additional income generated by the SRV.

If Option 3 (12.5% pa spread over 3 consecutive years) was implemented the estimated increase above ratepegging is:
